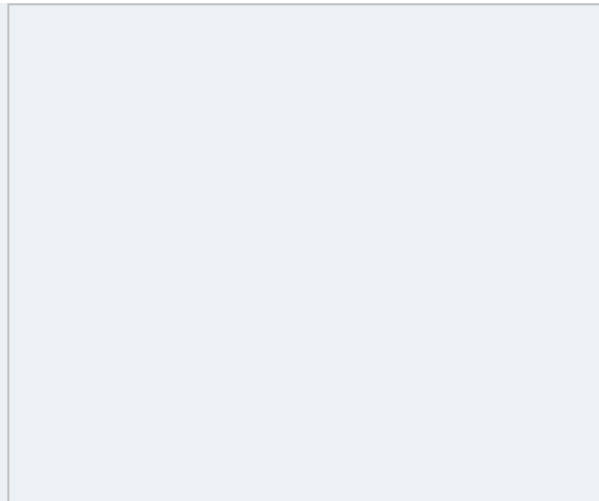

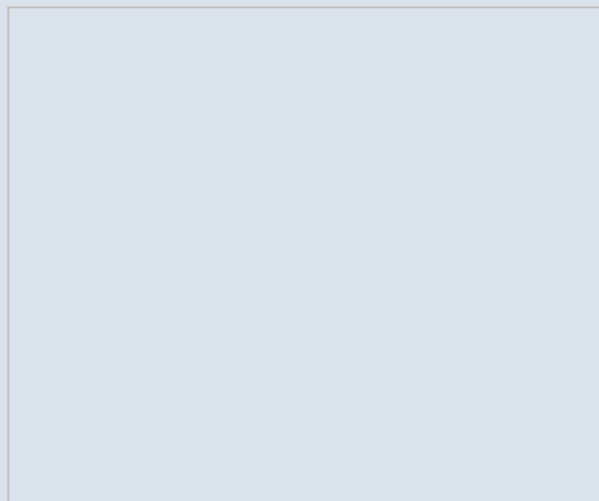

A 51-day confrontation between the FBI and the Branch Davidians – a small offshoot of the Seventh Day Adventists – came to a tragic end outside Waco, Texas on 19 April 1993. 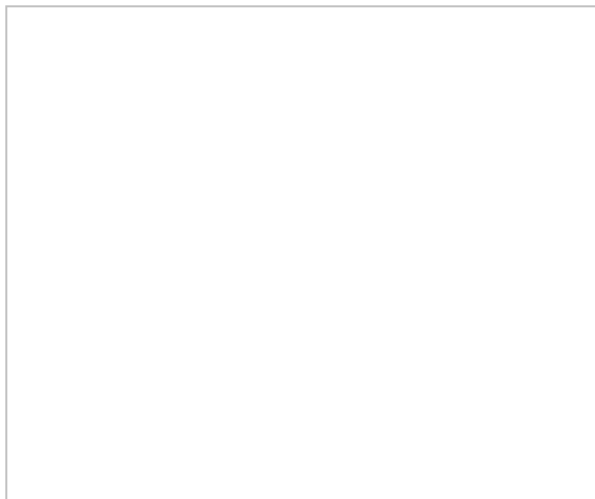

A closely-watched showdown

at the U.S. Supreme Court today will determine whether states can force out-of-state online retailers to collect sales tax. South Dakota is asking the nine justices to overturn a 1992 Supreme Court precedent, appealing a lower court decision that favored Wayfair (NYSE:[W](#)), Overstock (NASDAQ:[OSTK](#)) and Newegg. Amazon (NASDAQ:[AMZN](#)) is not involved in the case as it collects sales taxes on direct purchases on its site, although it makes an exception for third-party vendors.



Economy

China's economy grew 6.8% in the first quarter of 2018, despite widespread concerns about financial risks amid a government-led economic restructuring. "We'll face some challenges on trade in the foreseeable future," added Xing Zhihong, a spokesman at the National Bureau of Statistics, but said that "the U.S.-China trade friction can't beat the Chinese economy."

Besieged by alleged cronyism scandals at home, Japan's Shinzo Abe will meet with President Trump today for an important summit in Mar-a-Lago. Tokyo is one of the few American allies that hasn't been exempted from U.S. steel and aluminum tariffs, and Trump's decision to meet with North Korea's Kim Jong-un without consulting Abe has sparked fears of Japan being sidelined during nuclear negotiations.

Meanwhile, North and South Korea are in discussions to announce at next week's leaders' summit an official end to their military conflict, *Munhwa Ilbo* daily reports. The neighbors have not yet signed a peace treaty to replace the armistice which ended the Korean War in 1953. The summit will also focus on denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula and progress in inter-Korean relations.

Sterling saw some strong buying overnight, reaching its highest level since Britain voted to leave the EU in June 2016. At \$1.4363, the currency broke the most recent high seen

back in January, [climbing 6%](#) YTD. The strengthening has been caused by expectations that the Bank of England will hike rates, as well as the freshly reached Brexit transition deal.

Richard Clarida has been with PIMCO for 30 years, and an economic professor at Columbia for the last four years, but he's set to be nominated for the vice chairman's post at the Fed, according to the *WSJ*. Described more as pragmatist, rather than ideologue, Clarida also previously served as the Treasury Department's top economist during George W. Bush's term.

Stocks

The U.S. Commerce Department has slapped a seven-year ban on U.S. sales to China's ZTE ([OTCPK:ZTCOF](#)) for breaking terms of an agreement reached last year after it was found to be illegally shipping goods to Iran. Caught in the crossfire is Qualcomm ([NASDAQ:QCOM](#)), whose products account for the lion's share of chips inside ZTE smartphones. Qualcomm is also grappling with regulatory approval in China for a takeover of NXP Semiconductors ([NASDAQ:NXPI](#)).

Microsoft is warming up to Linux once again, using it to secure its first Azure Sphere chipset, the MT3620. "Of course we are a Windows company, but what we've recognized is the best solution for a computer of this size in a toy is not a full version of Windows," said chief legal officer Brad Smith. Microsoft ([NASDAQ:MSFT](#)) joined the Linux Foundation in 2016 and rebranded public cloud Windows Azure as Microsoft Azure.

Adding to the privacy woes that have been mounting against Facebook ([NASDAQ:FB](#)): The social network must face a class action suit alleging it unlawfully used a facial recognition process called DeepFace - to match similar photos after tagging - without user permission. Storing the biometric data could result in "damages that amount to billions of dollars," according to U.S. District Judge James Donato.

Forget Cambridge Analytica? The biggest stock-picking fund at BlackRock ([NYSE:BLK](#)), the Global Allocation Fund, raised its bet on Facebook ([FB](#)) in March, making the social network a top 10 equity holding. The increases in Facebook shares were enough to make the company the \$36.7B fund's sixth largest stock holding at March 30, up 10 spots from where it had been two months earlier.

The Department of Defense has updated its request for proposals from potential bidders on a \$10B cloud services project, in a deal that has been closely watched because Amazon ([AMZN](#)) has been considered a top contender. The U.S. is also exploring ways to retaliate against Beijing's restrictions on U.S. cloud providers and other tech services, opening a new front on its trade offensive against China.

T-Mobile has agreed to pay a \$40M fine over accusations that the company tried to cover

up poor rural cell service with "false rings." The settlement, announced by the FCC, also requires T-Mobile (NASDAQ:[TMUS](#)) to implement a "compliance plan" to address the issues. The nation's third-largest wireless carrier said it stopped using the false ring tones last January.

Years of courtroom battles between billionaire Steve Wynn, founder of casino operator Wynn Resorts (NASDAQ:[WYNN](#)), and his ex-wife, Elaine Wynn, have ended with a settlement. The long-running lawsuit centered on a since-dissolved shareholders' agreement and claims involving breach of contract. Neither Wynn Resorts nor its general counsel paid any money to Ms. Wynn, according to the company.

Continuing to reshape its business, Sanofi (NYSE:[SNY](#)) is in talks to sell its Zentiva European generic drugs arm to private equity firm Advent International for €1.9B. That's after spending more than \$16B to buy biotech company Ablynx (NASDAQ:[ABLX](#)) and haemophilia specialist Bioverativ (NASDAQ:[BIVV](#)). This week, Sanofi also sold some brands to Cooper-Vemedia drugs manufacturing arm for €158M.

Walmart is overhauling its website as it battles Amazon ([AMZN](#)) for shoppers' dollars online. The new site, rolling out in May, is highly personalized with features that make it easier to reorder items, explore services at nearby stores, and discover products that are trending locally. According to comScore, Walmart.com (NYSE:[WMT](#)) has around 100M unique monthly visitors, compared with 180M at rival Amazon.com.

Further opening its markets, China is removing a two-decade restriction on foreign automakers, which can currently only own a 50% share of any local venture. The rule change could boost Tesla (NASDAQ:[TSLA](#)), which has been seeking to set up a wholly owned plant in Shanghai, as well as other global carmakers. Ownership limits for new EVs will be removed this year, commercial vehicles in 2020 and passenger vehicles in 2022.

Despite the news... Tesla ([TSLA](#)) **-1.5%** premarket after announcing another production halt of the Model 3, days after CEO Elon Musk said the automaker's pace of making 2,000 of the sedans a week is sustainable. A spokesman repeated past statements that shutdowns are "used to improve automation and systematically address bottlenecks in order to increase production rates."

Ramping up its Level 4 testing program, Alibaba (NYSE:[BABA](#)) is hiring 50 self-driving vehicle experts, according to the *South China Morning Post*. Meanwhile, Toyota (NYSE:[TM](#)) plans to start selling U.S. vehicles in 2021 that can talk to each other via short-range wireless technology to "realize a future with zero fatalities from crashes, better traffic flow and less congestion."

Kentucky: Legislators Break “No New Taxes” Pledge But Give Tax Cuts to Rich

This [editorial in a Kentucky newspaper thanks teachers for breaking a legislative deadlock](#). There will be new taxes. There will be money for pensions. But watching the Republican Legislature jump through hoops to prove how conservative they are can make your head spin. There will be new cuts to education to fund tax breaks for the rich.

They have learned nothing.

”First some good news: Teachers were heard.

“Lawmakers knew that fired-up educators and pro-education Kentuckians, who filled the Capitol for weeks, were watching.

“That’s a big reason the Republicans who control the General Assembly abandoned some of Republican Gov. Matt Bevin’s and their own worst ideas for cutting public pensions and public spending.

”Instead, lawmakers chose — of all things — to raise taxes. Many had to break the pledge that they had signed to oppose all tax increases. They responded to the needs and demands of Kentuckians rather than answer to distant anti-government puppet

masters. That's refreshing and encouraging.

"Unfortunately (bad news starts here), rather than investing in educating Kentuckians and building 21st century infrastructure, Republican lawmakers gave away a big chunk of that new tax revenue in the form of tax cuts that will most benefit affluent individuals...

"As Jason Bailey of the Kentucky Center for Economic Policy writes, "In an economy where most income growth is at the top and where corporations are experiencing record profits, a tax system that taxes them less while taxing low- and middle-income people more will result in slower revenue growth,"

"Republicans, who proudly say that once their tax plan becomes law Kentucky will be among the 10 states with the lowest income taxes, are devoted to the notion that low income taxes trigger economic growth. Time will tell.

"More likely, though, new budget crises are in Kentucky's future — at which point lawmakers will have to take their pencils to the tax exemptions and economic incentives that drain billions from state coffers and that went largely unexamined in this session."

The Kentucky Republicans don't need to wait and see. They could just look at Kansas and Oklahoma as states where their ideas were tried and failed.

"Meanwhile, despite almost \$250 million a year in net new revenue, Kentucky will still underfund education, even though it would have been worse under Bevin's budget or the budget passed by the Senate.

"A decade-long disinvestment in higher education will continue. Kentucky has cut almost a quarter-billion dollars in state support for higher ed since 2008.

"On the up side, the state will continue to fund transportation and school employee health insurance at close to current levels. Bevin had proposed shifting much of the cost of running school buses onto local districts.

"But the budget makes many cuts in education, including preschool, textbooks and instructional resources, family resource and youth service centers, extended school services, teacher professional development.

"Lawmakers did the most important thing they could to solve the underfunding of public pensions: They fully funded public pensions. Rebuilding the once healthy pension funds will take decades, but the only way to do it is one year at a time."

Why is New York Condoning Illiteracy?

Shulem Deen was raised in an Orthodox home. He wrote an [opinion article in the New York Times today about the low quality of education he received in religious schools](#).

He writes:

"Last Friday, as observant Jews hurried with last-minute preparations for Passover, one Orthodox Jew was in Albany, holding up the New York State budget. He was insisting that this roughly \$168 billion package include a special provision that would allow religious schools to meet the state's educational requirements by using their long hours of religious instruction.

"In recent years, education activists, among them former Hasidic yeshiva graduates, have pushed aggressively to bring the yeshivas into compliance with the state's education laws. Simcha Felder, the state senator from Brooklyn who represents the heavily ultra-Orthodox neighborhoods of Borough Park and Midwood, was on a mission to get legal permission for the state to turn a blind eye to the near-absence of secular instruction in many yeshivas. The upshot? Tens of thousands of children would continue to graduate without the most basic skills.

"I know about the cost. I was one of those kids.

"I was raised in New York's Hasidic community and educated in its schools. At my yeshiva elementary school, I received robust instruction in Talmudic discourse and Jewish religious law, but not a word about history, geography, science, literature, art or most other subjects required by New York State law. I received rudimentary instruction in English and arithmetic — an afterthought after a long day of religious studies — but by high school, secular studies were dispensed with altogether.

"The language of instruction was, for the most part, Yiddish. English, our teachers would remind us, was profane...

"When I was in my 20s, already a father of three, I had no marketable skills, despite 18 years of schooling. I could rely only on an ill-paid position as a teacher of religious studies at the local boys' yeshiva, which required no special training or certification. As our family grew steadily — birth control, or even basic sexual education, wasn't part of the curriculum — my wife and I struggled, even with food stamps, Medicaid and Section 8 housing vouchers, which are officially factored into the budgets of many of New York's Hasidic families....

"I now have two sons, ages 16 and 18. I do not have custody of them — I lost it when I left the Hasidic world, and so I have no control over their education. Today, they cannot speak, read or write in English past a second-grade level. (As for my three daughters, their English skills are fine. Girls, not obligated with Torah study, generally receive a decent secular education.)

"Like me, my sons will be expected to marry young and raise large families. They too will receive no guidance on how to provide for them and will be forced into low-wage jobs and rely heavily on government support.

"They are not alone. Across the state, there are dozens of Hasidic yeshivas, with tens of thousands of students — nearly 60,000 in New York City alone — whose education is being atrociously neglected. These schools receive hundreds of millions of dollars in government funding, through federal programs like Title I and Head Start and state programs like Academic Intervention Services and universal pre-K. For New York City's yeshivas, \$120 million comes from the state-funded, city-run Child Care and Development Block Grant subsidy program: nearly a quarter of the allocation to the entire city."

These are the schools to which Betsy DeVos would supply vouchers. What a shame. The children deserve better education.

But New York's plan also creates a new "core subject performance index" that reflects the results only for the portion of students who actually take the state tests [emphasis added] If the result using the index calculation is better, that performance measure can be used to determine whether a school is targeted for additional funding and academic support. In essence, both of these measures are looked at," Schwartz [of NYSED] told the Regents... "if we have schools that have high achievement but also have high rates of non-participation, those schools will not likely end up on our list of those schools that need to be focused upon." [1]

Schools have a legal obligation to administer the state tests. HOWEVER, parents have the legal right to opt out their children free of coercion or penalties of any sort.

Jan Resseger: Teachers Speaking Out for a Decent State Budget, Their Pensions, and Public Responsibility

Jan Resseger reflects on the [excitement of seeing teachers standing up for themselves and for their students and schools](#).

They refuse to be pushed around anymore.

The governor of Oklahoma [insulted teachers, saying they were like teenagers who wanted a better](#) car. How much is she paid to defend the interests of the oil and gas industry? She even claimed that the state's teachers were influenced by outside groups,

like “antifa,” the black-clothed anti-fascist agitators. Shades of the civil rights movement, when racist governors refused to believe that “their” blacks wanted change.

Resseger writes:

“If you have been watching the courageous teachers, first in West Virginia, now in Oklahoma and Kentucky, standing up for their right to be paid fairly—to have a pension after long years of working with children and adolescents—to work in schools adequately supplied with enough counselors and social workers, technology and an ample and stimulating curriculum—I wonder if, like me, you find it refreshing to see a large number of teachers out in the open speaking about what they do. In these days of too many guns, teachers are more and more safely locked into schools with the children they teach. They and their contributions are pretty much invisible to the rest of us. We forget about them and we take them for granted.

“We neglect to make any mental connection to what it means for teachers (and children) when politicians promise us we can grow the economy by slashing taxes. Teachers, however, have to pay attention when ballooning class sizes make it harder to address personally the needs of 35 or 40 children. They watch kids grieve when football or instrumental music or a high school newspaper dies. They notice when there are too few counselors to help students whose parents are not college educated put together a good college application. They know the consequences when their rural school lacks access to broadband. Better than anybody else, school teachers understand the meaning of cuts to the state education budget. And this month teachers have been creating opportunities to tell us all what they know.

“Maybe part of our forgetting about teachers comes from gender bias. As we have all noticed in West Virginia last month, and now in Oklahoma and Kentucky, most of these teachers are energetic young women. All the old messages come into play: Teachers do their work because they love our children; the money isn’t so important to them. They’re probably married and have another income to depend on in addition to whatever they can bring in from teaching. These women should be good sports as they do more with less. And the worst: Teaching is really just glorified babysitting.

“Teachers do love to work with our children, but at the same time their work is the job by which they must support their own children. They must pay for food, housing, a car, and childcare. The required contribution to the family’s health insurance keeps rising. They have to save for their children’s college, and they need to save for retirement, particularly when the pensions they pay into every month are cut.”

Florida: Charter School in Financial Chaos

[The Eagle Arts Charter School is deep in a financial hole and can't pay its teachers.](#)

"In a raucous board meeting on the school's campus, Gregory Blount, the school's executive director and founder, revealed that the financially struggling school has little money in the bank and that the school has been operating on short-term loans since November.

"The tumult raised fears that the 425-student school might be forced to close later this month if the school can't persuade enough teachers to continue working.

"Accusing Blount of misleading the staff, the school's two principals resigned during Monday's board meeting, and the board chairman and the school's special-education coordinator threatened to quit as well if Blount wasn't removed from his position. Several other staffers also threatened to resign.

"I can no longer support something that I feel is an absolute charade," board Chairman Tim Quinn said.

"Blount has been criticized for steering more than \$150,000 of school money into his own companies since the school opened in 2014. In 2016, he was forced to repay \$46,000 after The Palm Beach Post revealed that the school gave him the money in the guise of a loan."

Arizona: Inside a D-Rated Junior High School Where Kids Are Learning

I have said it before, and I will say it again. Giving letter grades to schools is stupid. How would you feel if your child came home from school with only a single letter grade? If you are a parent, you would be furious. Rightly so. Every child has strengths and weaknesses, is good at this, not so good at that, getting better at this, not interested in that. Can you sum up a child as an A child, a B child, a C child, a D child or an F child? I don't think so.

Yet, following the bad ideas spun out of Jeb Bush's brain, red states have adopted the letter grading strategy for entire schools. Schools that have strengths and weaknesses, areas in which they are doing magnificently, and areas where they can improve. Every school consists of millions of moving parts, yet the letter grade assumes that a single letter can sum up the school. This is truly stupid.

[Reporter Lily Altadena spent time in a D rated junior high school in Arizona.](#) What she describes is a good school with a good principal, and students who are doing their best to do better. Yet the school was rated a D. The principal is heartbroken. The school is her baby. The children are her children. Yet the school is stigmatized as a D school. What will parents think? Will they pull their children out and send them to the fly-by-night charter school down the street or across town? Will the school fall into a death spiral?

The letter grades correlate with the school's affluence or poverty. In effect, the school is punished because it enrolls too many high-poverty students.

Only an idiot or a malevolent fool would subject schools to this kind of cruel judgment.

O Brave New World!

China has brought [surveillance of its citizens to new levels, using face recognition technology.](#)

A woman jaywalked, thinking nothing of it. The police demanded her identity card, but she didn't have it. They snapped her picture and promptly pulled up her identity and her personal history.

This incident was but a small indicator of China's determination to monitor its people.

"Mao Yan's Shenzhen is part of one of the great social experiments of mankind — the use of massive amounts of data, combined with facial recognition technology, shaming and artificial intelligence to control a population via marriage of the state and private companies. Already on the packed highways of Shanghai, honking has decreased. That's because directional microphones coupled with high-definition cameras can identify and ticket — again, via WeChat — noisy drivers and display their names, photographs and identity card numbers on the city's many LED boards. On some streets, if drivers stop their cars by the side of the road longer than seven minutes, high-definition cameras identify the driver and, again, issue him or her an instant ticket...

"But as Mao Yan's story makes clear, this technology is bleeding into the rest of China, where 95 percent of the population is Han Chinese. And China's authorities won't be content with traffic stops. Their goal is behavioral modification on a massive scale. Chinese planners have announced their intention to tap the vast AI and surveillance infrastructure currently under construction to generate "social credit" scores for all of China's 1.5 billion people. With a high score, traveling, securing a loan, buying a car and

other benefits will be easy to come by. Run afoul of the authorities, and problems begin. Some Chinese businessmen who are benefiting from this massive investment in data have argued that the Chinese are less concerned about privacy than people in the United States. Robin Li, the founder of Baidu, China's version of Google, which routinely shares its data with the Chinese Communist Party, argued over the weekend that Chinese people don't care that much about privacy. "The Chinese people are more open or less sensitive about the privacy issue," said Li, speaking at the China Development Forum in Beijing. "If they are able to trade privacy for convenience, safety and efficiency, in a lot of cases, they are willing to do that." Ironically, Li's remarks were released by the Chinese magazine Caixin on the same day that Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg issued an apology for releasing user data to a political consultancy. In her article, Mao Yan didn't seem to agree with Li's optimistic interpretation of the campaign. "Maybe," she wrote, "it's intimidation to make everyone afraid." I think she's right. Hours after Mao Yan posted her story on China's Internet, censors took it down."

We should never normalize the invasion of privacy.

That's why I left Facebook. So did Elon Musk.

The protection of privacy—some basic human dignity—should concern us all.

Pennsylvania: Sentencing Date Set for Prison Term for Founder of Nation's First CyberCharter

Nick Trombetta, [founder of the nation's first cybercharter, will be sentenced on July 10.](#)

He admitted stealing \$8 million in public funds intended for his school.

The [long-delayed sentencing hearing](#) of former Pennsylvania Cyber Charter School CEO

Nick Trombetta on charges of tax fraud and conspiracy is set for July, according to information filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court.

The July 10 sentencing will come nearly five years after Trombetta, 62, was [indicted by a grand jury](#) on 11 counts of tax fraud and conspiracy in August 2013. He pleaded guilty to conspiring to defraud the IRS in August 2016.

He faces up to five years in federal prison.

Trombetta siphoned \$8 million from the Midland-based public school and used the money to stockpile retirement money and buy personal luxury goods for himself, his girlfriend and his family — including multiple homes and a twin-engine airplane.

The conspiracy involved Trombetta and several others – including his accountant, Neal Prence - moving the money to other companies created or controlled by Trombetta and filing false tax returns.

He had this great idea. Give a computer and distance instruction to students who enrolled. Collect full state tuition. He collected \$10,000 per student and had 10,000 students. He was rolling in dough. \$100 million. It is easy to let that kind of money go to your head or your bank account.

There are virtual charter schools operating across the country that are raking in lots of money that they don't need or deserve. What should they do with it?

If every charter operator who used his school's credit card as his personal piggy bank were put into jail, the jails would be overcrowded. If they happened to be privatized prisons, the charter industry would turn against privatization and demand decent public prisons.

This law was passed as result of the efforts of Simcha Felder, a State Senator from Brooklyn who alone held up the state budget in order to insert language intended to deprive students of their right to a basic education that will prepare them for good-paying jobs and success in life.

New York State law requires non-public schools to provide an education that is "at least substantially equivalent" to that of public schools, so that no student is left in ignorance. The law requires non-public schools to provide instruction in "arithmetic, reading, spelling, writing, the English language, geography, United States history, civics, hygiene, physical training, the history of New York state and science."

But this law has not been enforced for decades, by either the state or the city. The Mayor and the NYC Department of Education has delayed taking any action for over two and a half years, even after they had promised to do so repeatedly. The NY Commissioner of Education was in the process of drafting new guidelines to enforce the law, which

apparently prompted Sen. Felder's actions to attempt to exempt Yeshivas from meeting any educational standards. Meanwhile, tens of thousands of children are not receiving the basic education to which they are entitled.

At the press conference, advocates from Yaffed, former Yeshiva students and elected officials will speak out against extremists who are strong-arming our government to block sensible education policies, and. will discuss next steps in the fight to protect the human rights of all children to be adequately educated.

GERMANY: ISIS BEHEADING VIDEOS “SPREADING LIKE WILDFIRE” AMONG MIGRANTS IN SCHOOLS

President Of Teacher’s Association Warns Situation Spiraling Out Of Control

The President of Germany’s Teachers Association warns that ISIS beheading videos are “spreading like wildfire” amongsMuslim migrant children in German schools. In an article entitled Our schools are out of control, Heinz-Peter Meidinger said that the situation in some schools was becoming chronic, with increasing numbers of violent attacks on teachers creating the need for security guards at schools with migrant populations of 70 per cent and over.

Meidinger said that the attacks on teachers were primarily driven by cultural and religious attitudes held by Arab and North African teens who do not respect women. Anti-Semitic attacks on Jewish children are increasing too as more migrant children carry knives and pepper spray. “A Jewish girl was threatened with death by her classmates and time and time again there are anti-Semitic attacks in Berlin,” said Meidinger. Asked whether the circulation of an ISIS beheading video in a school in Berlin was an isolated case, Meidinger responded that such incidents were now commonplace. “Unfortunately, these are no longer individual cases, not even among very young students at elementary schools. Such incidents now exist at many schools in Germany. One thing is certain: Cruel violent videos in social networks have long since arrived in student life. In chat forums like WhatsApp, movies like the described ISIS beheading video are spreading like wildfire,” he said.

TEXAS TEEN BEATEN, HOT COOKING OIL POURED ON HER AFTER REFUSING ARRANGED MARRIAGE

Parents Agreed To Arranged Marriage In Exchange For \$20,000

Parents of a Texas high school student who was reported missing in late January had abused their daughter after she refused an arranged marriage, leading her to run away from home until she was found in mid-March.

Maarib Al Hishmawi, 16, was reported missing on Jan. 30 after she was last seen leaving Taft High School in Bexar County. She was located in mid-March when she was taken in by an organization that cared for her after she ran away.

Al Hishmawi's parents — Abdulah Fahmi Al Hishmawi, 34, and Hamdiah Saha Al Hishmawi, 33 — had beaten their daughter with a broomstick and poured hot cooking oil on her when she refused to marry a man in another city. The parents reportedly agreed to the arranged marriage in exchange for \$20,000.

REPORT: 1,000 ISIS JIHADIS RETURNING TO EUROPE

EU Nationals Allowed Back Home After Fighting For ISIS

Europol has warned that more than 1,000 ISIS jihadis could return to Europe as the group is pushed out of its final strongholds. Outgoing Europol director Rob Wainwright told the Press Association: "That's one of the big intelligence questions right now, about where these people are...We are concerned about it because it's a large number, it could still be over 1,000." "They are perhaps capable of coming back and if they do come back they will do so in an even more radicalized state than when they went out, given their exposure to the conflict."

HEADMASTER TELLS MOTHER OF DAUGHTER BULLIED BY MUSLIMS TO COVER HER UP WITH A HIJAB

Blonde Christian Girl With German-Hebrew name Beaten And Abused

The Headmaster of a Frankfurt school told girl's Mother to cover her daughter with a headscarf. The mother of the student reported that her daughter was being bullied by Muslim girls to such a degree that she had to take her out of school for protection. "She was beaten and verbally attacked on the way to school," said the mother, explaining that abuse was because her daughter has blonde hair, doesn't wear a headscarf, has a German-Hebrew name and is a Christian. When the headmaster was informed of the situation, he told the mother to cover up her daughter with a hijab. "Your daughter does not have to say that she is German. Besides, you can give her a headscarf!" the mother was told. The school refused to comment on the abuse. Meanwhile, at another school in in Ennepetal, children were bullied for eating gummy bears because the "impure" sweets contain contain pork gelatin. The report also mentions the case of two fourth-graders from Bavaria, who came home crying before telling their father, "This student has said he is **cutting off our heads because we are Christians.**" The mother of a third grader in Bonn also complained to a school after a Muslim student told her daughter, "Your parents will burn in hell if they do not believe in Allah." The story is yet another example of religious bullying and the Islamist takeover of schools in heavily migrant populated areas of Germany. The president of Germany's Teachers Association has warned that schools with over 70% migrant students are spiraling out of control, with attacks on female teachers and Jewish students becoming commonplace.

POLITICAL PERSECUTION: FREE SPEECH ON TRIAL IN FRANCE

Censors Want Marine Le Pen Prosecuted For Drawing Attention To The Atrocities Committed By Islamic State

“Free speech can’t just apply to those you agree with,” said Brendan O’Neill the editor of Spiked Online. Politically correct speech does not need protecting. The United States’ First Amendment exists precisely to protect the minority from the majority and to protect unpopular opinions from those who would silence them. On March 2, French prosecutors decided that Marine Le Pen should be prosecuted for drawing attention on Twitter to the atrocities committed by Islamic State. They apparently decided that Le Pen’s message, even if factually correct, should not be heard. Le Pen’s “crime,” the prosecutors allege, is that in a series of tweets, she posted disturbing images of victims of Islamic State, thereby exposing the crimes against humanity that group has been committing in the Levant. Presumably, these were potential dangers about which she thought the public should be aware. They included the beheading of the **British journalist, James Foley**, who was repeatedly beaten, starved, and waterboarded before his throat was slit.

Other tweets documented a Jordanian fighter pilot, Moaz al-Kasasbeh, in a cage, being burned alive, and a tank crushing a Syrian army soldier.

These crimes, however, are those of Islamic State, not Marine Le Pen.

Her most objectionable crime, apparently, was to have distributed a picture of Foley’s decapitated corpse with the tweet, “Daesh is THIS!” It would be hard to disagree. Even Islamic State does not deny that these events took place.

On, the contrary, it broadcast them globally. Le Pen was merely informing people, in the most striking way she could, that Islamic State is a murderous organization that continues to slaughter innocents.

ISRAEL ADMITS BOMBING SUSPECTED SYRIAN NUCLEAR REACTOR IN 2007, SHOULD BE A WARNING TO IRAN

Tel Aviv Says Nuclear Material Could Have Now Fallen Into ISIS Hands If Not Removed A Decade Prior

Israel for the first time admitted that it bombed a suspected Syrian nuclear reactor in 2007 and said the strike should be a warning to Iran that it would not be allowed to develop nuclear weapons. The Israeli military released previously classified cockpit footage, photographs and intelligence documents about its Sept. 6, 2007, air strike on the Al-Kubar facility near Deir al-Zor in eastern Syria. It said the reactor was being built with help from North Korea and the facility had been months away from activation. Israel's decision to go public comes after repeated calls in recent months by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for the United States and international community to take tougher action on Iran, Syria's ally.

CHINA CLAIMS KIM JONG UN HAS AGREED TO DENUCLEARIZE KOREAN PENINSULA

North Korean leader Kim Jong Un visited China from Sunday to Wednesday

China said on Wednesday it won a pledge from North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to denuclearize the Korean peninsula during a meeting with President Xi Jinping, who pledged in return that China would uphold its friendship with its isolated neighbor. After two days of speculation, China said that Kim had visited Beijing and met Xi during what the official Xinhua news agency called an unofficial visit. The trip was Kim's first known journey abroad since he assumed power in 2011 and is believed by analysts to serve as preparation for upcoming summits with South Korea and the United States. Beijing has traditionally been the closest ally of secretive North Korea, but ties have been frayed by North Korea's pursuit of nuclear weapons and China's backing of tough U.N. sanctions in response.

FBI RESPONDED TO SUSPICIOUS PACKAGES AT MULTIPLE GOVERNMENT FACILITIES

A man is in custody in connection with suspicious packages found at military bases

Thanh Cong Phan, 43, appeared in court in Washington state, a little more than 24 hours after 11 packages arrived at the bases. Phan previously had written crank letters to the military. The rambling notes included in the packages flagged him as a suspect. He was arrested Monday night at his home in Everett, Washington, and charged initially with one count of shipping explosive materials, which is punishable upon conviction by up to 10 years in prison.

The suspicious packages were left at Fort Belvoir, Fort McNair, Joint Base Anacostia-Bolling, and the Naval Surface Warfare Center. One package tested positive for gun powder and also had a fuse. Another contained a circuit board and a vial filled with an unidentified liquid. Several packages contained letters, which one official described as “disturbing.” The FBI is in possession of the packages and is trying to determine whether they could have exploded. “The FBI responded to multiple government facilities today for the reports of suspicious packages,” the bureau said in a statement. “Each package was collected for further analysis by the FBI.”

PRINCE ALWALEED MOVED TO MAX SECURITY SAUDI PRISON AFTER REFUSING TO PAY \$6 BILLION FOR FREEDOM

300 Princes, Ministers And Other Elites Rounded Up In ‘Anti-Corruption’ Purge

Saudi Arabia’s billionaire prince Alwaleed Bin Talal, has been carted off to Al Ha’ir prison, after refusing to pay \$6 billion to Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman (MbS) to secure his freedom. This results in a massive consolidation in which over 300 princes, ministers and other elites were rounded up in an “anti-corruption” purge. Sources told the Middle East Monitor that nearly 60 detainees were transferred to the most high security prison in the Kingdom. The prisoners include Prince Al-Waleed Bin Talal as Prince Turki Bin Abdullah and a number of government officials who refused to make the large financial payments for their release. Among those arrested on allegations of corruption is Prince Alwaleed Bin Talal, the Saudi King’s nephew who is worth more than \$17 billion according to Forbes. The crown prince had lulled Alwaleed into a false sense of security, inviting him to a meeting at his Al Yamamah palace, and then sent officers to arrest him the night before the meeting. “Suddenly at 2.45 AM all his guards were disarmed, the royal guards of MbS storm in. He was dragged from his own bedroom in his pajamas, handcuffed, put in the back of an SUV, and interrogated like a criminal. They hung them upside down, just to send a message.” Purged princes and the like were taken to the Riyadh Ritz Carlton Hotel, where they have reportedly been allowed to buy their freedom by giving up their billions in oil wealth for their lives.

AGING JAPAN: ROBOTS MAY HAVE ROLE IN FUTURE OF ELDER CARE

Today More People Live Alone than Years Past – Robots Can Be A Conversation Partner For Them’

Pepper, a humanoid, waves while leading a group of senior citizens in exercises. A disabled man taking shaky steps, is encouraged by a robot saying, “right, left, well done!” in a gentle feminine voice. Paro the furry pet robot seal coos softly while an elderly woman pets it. Robots have the run of Tokyo’s Shin-tomi nursing home, which uses 20 different models to care for its residents. The Japanese government hopes it will be a model for harnessing the country’s robotics expertise to help cope with a swelling elderly population and dwindling workforce. Robots can help to care for the elderly – a job typically seen as requiring a human touch. Many Japanese see them positively, largely because they are depicted in popular media as friendly and helpful. “These robots are wonderful,” said 84-year-old Kazuko Yamada after the exercise session with Pepper designed to carry on scripted dialogues. “More people live alone these days, and a robot can be a conversation partner for them. It will make life more fun.”

TRUMP: THE SECOND AMENDMENT WILL NEVER BE REPEALED

Former Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens Said The Second Amendment Is Outdated And Misunderstood

President Trump said the Second Amendment will never be repealed, despite a former Supreme Court justice’s words. “As much as Democrats would like to see this happen, and despite the words yesterday of former Supreme Court Justice Stevens, NO WAY,” the President added. “We need more Republicans in 2018 and must ALWAYS hold the Supreme Court!” Trump’s tweet follows an op-ed from former Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens, who said that the Second Amendment is outdated and misunderstood. 7TH-GRADER SUSPENDED FOR DRAWING STICK FIGURE WITH GUN

Thought-Police Punished Child With Two Day Suspension For Doodles

A 7th grade student in North Carolina was suspended for drawing a stick figure armed with a gun. Roseboro Salemburg Middle School suspended a 13-year-old boy two weeks ago for nothing more than a few harmless doodles. The student's father, James Ray Herring Jr., says there was nothing wrong with the drawings, one of which was a Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle. "I see a guy in a race car souped-up. I see a tower that he built. I see him holding his gun, he's a deer hunter. I see him with a magician," Mr Herring said. "He's just expressing himself, nothing violent." Mr Herring said his son hunts, but added that all firearms are safely stored at home. "I can see if he had drawn pictures blowing up people and had some hate words or something like that, but that picture is totally innocent," the boy's father added. The school's superintendent, on the other hand, argued the drawings could have met one of the school's threat categories, and cited the current anti-gun culture for the decision. "There are some things that list possible threats or things like that. We have categories – category one, two, three and four – which sort of grades potential incidents and the level of seriousness," Sampson County Superintendent Eric Bracy.

"Due to everything happening in the nation, we're just being extra vigilant about all issues of safety," Bracy explained. Herring's father says the punishment was too severe for something that's normal for kids to do.

"They could have at least given him a warning and said don't draw that picture. My son is a very loving child, he cried for two days because of this. Every day he would say 'all of my friends are at school and I'm here.'" Herring also defended law-abiding gun owners, explaining firearms are common in Sampson County. "Every other truck you see has a rifle in the back window, but does that [make] them bad people? That's my point. Guns are not bad. It's the idiots that do the damage. The seventh grader has returned to class, but Herring has scheduled a meeting with the school board to appeal the suspension.

COUNSELING AGAINST HOMOSEXUALITY MAY SOON BE ILLEGAL IN MARYLAND

Won't Be Able To Discuss "Alternatives" For People Questioning Their Sexuality

A bill moving through the Maryland General Assembly would prohibit health professionals from practicing "gay conversion therapy" on minors. The bill would classify the practice as unprofessional conduct and subject providers to discipline by the state licensing board. The state Senate gave it initial approval on Tuesday. "Gay conversion therapy" is also known as reparative therapy for homosexuality and is widely discredited by medical and mental-health associations. Nine other states and Washington D.C. outlaw the practice. The bill's sponsor is openly homosexual Sen. Richard S. Madaleno Jr., a Democrat from Montgomery County who is running for governor. Opponents included Sen. Johnny Ray Salling, R-Baltimore County, who is concerned that professionals won't be able to discuss "alternatives" for people questioning their sexuality.

DALLAS SCHOOL DISTRICT CONSIDERS RENAMING SCHOOLS NAMED AFTER FRANKLIN, JEFFERSON AND MADISON

Rename Schools Because Of Their Namesake's Ties To Slavery Or The Confederacy

Dallas Independent School District (DISD) included schools named after three of America's Founding Fathers on a list of schools that the district is exploring renaming. The DISD administration has already recommended renaming four schools named after Confederate generals, including Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson. The district is conducting additional research on whether to rename at least 20 other schools named after historical figures. The list of schools, posted by DISD board member Dustin Marshall includes schools named after Ben Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and James Madison. "I will not support a name change for Franklin since Benjamin Franklin clearly had many accomplishments that form the basis for why the school was named after him. I don't believe this school was named after Franklin to send a signal of oppression and control," Marshall wrote.

One of those officials, Plattsburgh President John Ettling who told by demonstrators "You don't need this job, bro," recently detailed ten "immediate and long-term initiatives" to improve the climate on campus. Some of the plans include increasing police presence on campus, the creation of a mandatory diversity course, organization of a social justice task force, and the "the hoisting of a Black Lives Matter flag and LGBT pride flag in the Angell College Center."

CHINA TO USE FACIAL RECOGNITION TO IDENTIFY JAYWALKERS, TEXT THEM FINES

Repeat Offenders Will See Negative Effects On 'Social Credit Score'

Police in the south of China will soon use facial recognition technology to identify jaywalkers and send them fines over text message. According to the South China Morning Post's Li Tao Tuesday, traffic officers in Shenzhen, who already utilize facial recognition to catch jaywalkers, are working with local artificial intelligence firm Intellifusion, mobile carriers and instant messaging companies to set up the new system. The messaging aspect is meant to compliment the recent installation at intersections of Intellifusion's LED screens – designed to shame offenders by displaying their faces.

"For the current system installed in Shenzhen, Intellifusion installed cameras with 7 million pixels of resolution to capture photos of pedestrians crossing the road against traffic lights," Tao writes. "Facial recognition technology identifies the individual from a database and displays a photo of the jaywalking offence, the family name of the offender and part of their government identification number on large LED screens above the pavement"

ASSANGE LOSES INTERNET, VISITOR PRIVILEGES AT ECUADORAN EMBASSY

Ecuadoran Government Severs Internet, Accuses WikiLeaks Founder Of Breaching Written Agreement

WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange lost his internet access and visitor privileges Wednesday at the Ecuadoran Embassy in London. In a statement from the Ecuadorian government, Assange is accused of breaching a written commitment signed at the end of 2017 concerning interference with other nations. “The Government of Ecuador warns that the behavior of Assange, with its messages through social networks, puts at risk the good relations that the country maintains with the United Kingdom, with the rest of the States of the European Union and other nations,” a translated section of the announcement says. The statement, which says the action is intended to “prevent potential damage,” does not detail how long Assange’s privileges will be revoked.

Ecuador took similar action by severing Assange’s internet access in 2016 after WikiLeaks began publishing documents related to the 2016 election.

“The Government of Ecuador respects the principle of non-intervention in the internal affairs of other states,” an statement said. “It does not interfere in external electoral processes, nor does it favor any particular candidate.”

NEW ORGAN DISCOVERED IN HUMAN BODY

Compartments May Act As “Shock Absorbers” That Protect Body From Damage

Scientists have identified a new human organ hiding in plain sight. The discovery they hope could help them understand the spread of cancer within the body. Layers long thought to be dense, connective tissue are actually a series of fluid-filled compartments researchers have termed the “interstitium.” These compartments are found beneath the skin, as well as lining the gut, lungs, blood vessels and muscles, and join together to form a network supported by a mesh of strong, flexible proteins. New analysis published in the journal *Scientific Reports* is the first to identify these spaces collectively as a new organ and try to understand their function. Remarkably, the interstitium had previously gone unnoticed despite being one of the largest organs in the human body.

The compartments may act as “shock absorbers” that protect body tissues from damage. Mount Sinai Beth Israel Medical Center medics Dr David Carr-Locke and Dr Petros Benias came across the interstitium while investigating a patient’s bile duct, searching for signs of cancer. They noticed cavities that did not match any previously known human anatomy, and approached New York University pathologist Dr Neil Theise to ask for his expertise. The researchers realized traditional methods for examining body tissues had missed the interstitium because the “fixing” method for assembling medical microscope slides involves draining away fluid – therefore destroying the organ’s structure. Instead of their true identity as body wide, fluid-filled shock absorbers, the squashed cells had been overlooked and considered a simple layer of connective tissue.

GERMANY: ISIS BEHEADING VIDEOS “SPREADING LIKE WILDFIRE” AMONG MIGRANTS IN SCHOOLS

President Of Teacher’s Association Warns Situation Spiraling Out Of Control

The President of Germany’s Teachers Association warns that ISIS beheading videos are “spreading like wildfire” amongsMuslim migrant children in German schools. In an article entitled Our schools are out of control, Heinz-Peter Meidinger said that the situation in some schools was becoming chronic, with increasing numbers of violent attacks on teachers creating the need for security guards at schools with migrant populations of 70 per cent and over.

Meidinger said that the attacks on teachers were primarily driven by cultural and religious attitudes held by Arab and North African teens who do not respect women. Anti-Semitic attacks on Jewish children are increasing too as more migrant children carry knives and pepper spray. “A Jewish girl was threatened with death by her classmates and time and time again there are anti-Semitic attacks in Berlin,” said Meidinger. Asked whether the circulation of an ISIS beheading video in a school in Berlin was an isolated case, Meidinger responded that such incidents were now commonplace. “Unfortunately, these are no longer individual cases, not even among very young students at elementary schools. Such incidents now exist at many schools in Germany. One thing is certain: Cruel violent videos in social networks have long since arrived in student life. In chat forums like WhatsApp, movies like the described ISIS beheading video are spreading like wildfire,” he said.

TEXAS TEEN BEATEN, HOT COOKING OIL POURED ON HER AFTER REFUSING ARRANGED MARRIAGE

Parents Agreed To Arranged Marriage In Exchange For \$20,000

Parents of a Texas high school student who was reported missing in late January had abused their daughter after she refused an arranged marriage, leading her to run away from home until she was found in mid-March.

Maarib Al Hishmawi, 16, was reported missing on Jan. 30 after she was last seen leaving Taft High School in Bexar County. She was located in mid-March when she was taken in by an organization that cared for her after she ran away.

Al Hishmawi's parents — Abdulah Fahmi Al Hishmawi, 34, and Hamdiyah Saha Al Hishmawi, 33 — had beaten their daughter with a broomstick and poured hot cooking oil on her when she refused to marry a man in another city. The parents reportedly agreed to the arranged marriage in exchange for \$20,000.

REPORT: 1,000 ISIS JIHADIS RETURNING TO EUROPE

EU Nationals Allowed Back Home After Fighting For ISIS

Europol has warned that more than 1,000 ISIS jihadis could return to Europe as the group is pushed out of its final strongholds. Outgoing Europol director Rob Wainwright told the Press Association: "That's one of the big intelligence questions right now, about where these people are...We are concerned about it because it's a large number, it could still be over 1,000." "They are perhaps capable of coming back and if they do come back they will do so in an even more radicalized state than when they went out, given their exposure to the conflict."

HEADMASTER TELLS MOTHER OF DAUGHTER BULLIED BY MUSLIMS TO COVER HER UP WITH A HIJAB

Blonde Christian Girl With German-Hebrew name Beaten And Abused

The Headmaster of a Frankfurt school told girl's Mother to cover her daughter with a headscarf. The mother of the student reported that her daughter was being bullied by Muslim girls to such a degree that she had to take her out of school for protection. "She was beaten and verbally attacked on the way to school," said the mother, explaining that abuse was because her daughter has blonde hair, doesn't wear a headscarf, has a German-Hebrew name and is a Christian. When the headmaster was informed of the situation, he told the mother to cover up her daughter with a hijab. "Your daughter does not have to say that she is German. Besides, you can give her a headscarf!" the mother was told. The school refused to comment on the abuse. Meanwhile, at another school in in Ennepetal, children were bullied for eating gummy bears because the "impure" sweets contain contain pork gelatin. The report also mentions the case of two fourth-graders from Bavaria, who came home crying before telling their father, "This student has said he is **cutting off our heads because we are Christians.**" The mother of a third grader in Bonn also complained to a school after a Muslim student told her daughter, "Your parents will burn in hell if they do not believe in Allah." The story is yet another example of religious bullying and the Islamist takeover of schools in heavily migrant populated areas of Germany. The president of Germany's Teachers Association has warned that schools with over 70% migrant students are spiraling out of control, with attacks on female teachers and Jewish students becoming commonplace.

“Free speech can’t just apply to those you agree with,” said Brendan O’Neill the editor of Spiked Online. Politically correct speech does not need protecting. The United States’ First Amendment exists precisely to protect the minority from the majority and to protect unpopular opinions from those who would silence them. On March 2, French prosecutors decided that Marine Le Pen should be prosecuted for drawing attention on Twitter to the atrocities committed by Islamic State. These crimes, however, are those of Islamic State, not Marine Le Pen.

Her most objectionable crime, apparently, was to have distributed a picture of Foley’s decapitated corpse with the tweet, “Daesh is THIS!” It would be hard to disagree. Even Islamic State does not deny that these events took place.

On, the contrary, it broadcast them globally. Le Pen was merely informing people, in the most striking way she could, that Islamic State is a murderous organization that continues to slaughter innocents.

ISRAEL ADMITS BOMBING SUSPECTED SYRIAN NUCLEAR REACTOR IN 2007, SHOULD BE A WARNING TO IRAN

Tel Aviv Says Nuclear Material Could Have Now Fallen Into ISIS Hands If Not Removed A Decade Prior

Israel for the first time admitted that it bombed a suspected Syrian nuclear reactor in 2007 and said the strike should be a warning to Iran that it would not be allowed to develop nuclear weapons. The Israeli military released previously classified cockpit footage, photographs and intelligence documents about its Sept. 6, 2007, air strike on the Al-Kubar facility near Deir al-Zor in eastern Syria. It said the reactor was being built with help from North Korea and the facility had been months away from activation. Israel's decision to go public comes after repeated calls in recent months by Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu for the United States and international community to take tougher action on Iran, Syria's ally.

CHINA CLAIMS KIM JONG UN HAS AGREED TO DENUCLEARIZE KOREAN PENINSULA

North Korean leader Kim Jong Un visited China from Sunday to Wednesday

China said on Wednesday it won a pledge from North Korean leader Kim Jong Un to denuclearize the Korean peninsula during a meeting with President Xi Jinping, who pledged in return that China would uphold its friendship with its isolated neighbor. After two days of speculation, China said that Kim had visited Beijing and met Xi during what the official Xinhua news agency called an unofficial visit. The trip was Kim's first known journey abroad since he assumed power in 2011 and is believed by analysts to serve as preparation for upcoming summits with South Korea and the United States. Beijing has traditionally been the closest ally of secretive North Korea, but ties have been frayed by North Korea's pursuit of nuclear weapons and China's backing of tough U.N. sanctions in response.

FBI RESPONDED TO SUSPICIOUS PACKAGES AT MULTIPLE GOVERNMENT FACILITIES

A man is in custody in connection with suspicious packages found at military bases

Thanh Cong Phan, 43, appeared in court in Washington state, a little more than 24 hours after 11 packages arrived at the bases. Phan previously had written crank letters to the military. The rambling notes included in the packages flagged him as a suspect. He was arrested Monday night at his home in Everett, Washington, and charged initially with one count of shipping explosive materials, which is punishable upon conviction by up to 10 years in prison.

The suspicious packages were left at Fort Belvoir, Fort McNair, Joint Base Anacostia-Bolling, and the Naval Surface Warfare Center. One package tested positive for gun powder and also had a fuse. Another contained a circuit board and a vial filled with an unidentified liquid. Several packages contained letters, which one official described as “disturbing.” The FBI is in possession of the packages and is trying to determine whether they could have exploded. “The FBI responded to multiple government facilities today for the reports of suspicious packages,” the bureau said in a statement. “Each package was collected for further analysis by the FBI.”

PRINCE ALWALEED MOVED TO MAX SECURITY SAUDI PRISON AFTER REFUSING TO PAY \$6 BILLION FOR FREEDOM

300 Princes, Ministers And Other Elites Rounded Up In ‘Anti-Corruption’ Purge

Saudi Arabia’s billionaire prince Alwaleed Bin Talal, has been carted off to Al Ha’ir prison, after refusing to pay \$6 billion to Crown Prince Mohammed Bin Salman (MbS) to secure his freedom. This results in a massive consolidation in which over 300 princes, ministers and other elites were rounded up in an “anti-corruption” purge. Sources told the Middle East Monitor that nearly 60 detainees were transferred to the most high security prison in the Kingdom. The prisoners include Prince Al-Waleed Bin Talal as Prince Turki Bin Abdullah and a number of government officials who refused to make the large financial payments for their release. Among those arrested on allegations of corruption is Prince Alwaleed Bin Talal, the Saudi King’s nephew who is worth more than \$17 billion according to Forbes. The crown prince had lulled Alwaleed into a false sense of security, inviting him to a meeting at his Al Yamamah palace, and then sent officers to arrest him the night before the meeting. “Suddenly at 2.45 AM all his guards were disarmed, the royal guards of MbS storm in. He was dragged from his own bedroom in his pajamas, handcuffed, put in the back of an SUV, and interrogated like a criminal. They hung them upside down, just to send a message.” Purged princes and the like were taken to the Riyadh Ritz Carlton Hotel, where they have reportedly been allowed to buy their freedom by giving up their billions in oil wealth for their lives.

AGING JAPAN: ROBOTS MAY HAVE ROLE IN FUTURE OF ELDER CARE

Today More People Live Alone than Years Past – Robots Can Be A Conversation Partner For Them’

Pepper, a humanoid, waves while leading a group of senior citizens in exercises. A disabled man taking shaky steps, is encouraged by a robot saying, “right, left, well done!” in a gentle feminine voice. Paro the furry pet robot seal coos softly while an elderly woman pets it. Robots have the run of Tokyo’s Shin-tomi nursing home, which uses 20 different models to care for its residents. The Japanese government hopes it will be a model for harnessing the country’s robotics expertise to help cope with a swelling elderly population and dwindling workforce. Robots can help to care for the elderly – a job typically seen as requiring a human touch. Many Japanese see them positively, largely because they are depicted in popular media as friendly and helpful. “These robots are wonderful,” said 84-year-old Kazuko Yamada after the exercise session with Pepper designed to carry on scripted dialogues. “More people live alone these days, and a robot can be a conversation partner for them. It will make life more fun.”

TRUMP: THE SECOND AMENDMENT WILL NEVER BE REPEALED

Former Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens Said The Second Amendment Is Outdated And Misunderstood

7TH-GRADER SUSPENDED FOR DRAWING STICK FIGURE WITH GUN

Thought-Police Punished Child With Two Day Suspension For Doodles

A 7th grade student in North Carolina was suspended for drawing a stick figure armed with a gun. Roseboro Salemburg Middle School suspended a 13-year-old boy two weeks ago for nothing more than a few harmless doodles. The student's father, James Ray Herring Jr., says there was nothing wrong with the drawings, one of which was a Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle. "I see a guy in a race car souped-up. I see a tower that he built. I see him holding his gun, he's a deer hunter. I see him with a magician," Mr Herring said. "He's just expressing himself, nothing violent." Mr Herring said his son hunts, but added that all firearms are safely stored at home. "I can see if he had drawn pictures blowing up people and had some hate words or something like that, but that picture is totally innocent," the boy's father added. The school's superintendent, on the other hand, argued the drawings could have met one of the school's threat categories, and cited the current anti-gun culture for the decision. "There are some things that list possible threats or things like that. We have categories – category one, two, three and four – which sort of grades potential incidents and the level of seriousness," Sampson County Superintendent Eric Bracy.

"Due to everything happening in the nation, we're just being extra vigilant about all issues of safety," Bracy explained. Herring's father says the punishment was too severe for something that's normal for kids to do.

"They could have at least given him a warning and said don't draw that picture. My son is a very loving child, he cried for two days because of this. Every day he would say 'all of my friends are at school and I'm here.'" Herring also defended law-abiding gun owners, explaining firearms are common in Sampson County. COUNSELING AGAINST HOMOSEXUALITY MAY SOON BE ILLEGAL IN MARYLAND

Won't Be Able To Discuss "Alternatives" For People Questioning Their Sexuality

A bill moving through the Maryland General Assembly would prohibit health professionals from practicing "gay conversion therapy" on minors. The bill would classify the practice as unprofessional conduct and subject providers to discipline by the state licensing board. The state Senate gave it initial approval on Tuesday. "Gay conversion therapy" is also known as reparative therapy for homosexuality and is widely discredited by medical and mental-health associations. Nine other states and Washington D.C. outlaw the practice. The bill's sponsor is openly homosexual Sen. Richard S. Madaleno Jr., a Democrat from Montgomery County who is running for governor. Opponents included Sen. Johnny Ray Salling, R-Baltimore County, who is concerned that professionals won't be able to discuss "alternatives" for people questioning their sexuality.

Dallas Independent School District (DISD) included schools named after three of America's Founding Fathers on a list of schools that the district is exploring renaming. CHINA TO USE FACIAL RECOGNITION TO IDENTIFY JAYWALKERS, TEXT THEM FINES

Repeat Offenders Will See Negative Effects On ‘Social Credit Score’

Police in the south of China will soon use facial recognition technology to identify jaywalkers and send them fines over text message. According to the South China Morning Post's Li Tao Tuesday, traffic officers in Shenzhen, who already utilize facial recognition to catch jaywalkers, are working with local artificial intelligence firm Intellifusion, mobile carriers and instant messaging companies to set up the new system. The messaging aspect is meant to compliment the recent installation at intersections of Intellifusion's LED screens – designed to shame offenders by displaying their faces.

“For the current system installed in Shenzhen, Intellifusion installed cameras with 7 million pixels of resolution to capture photos of pedestrians crossing the road against traffic lights,” Tao writes. “Facial recognition technology identifies the individual from a database and displays a photo of the jaywalking offence, the family name of the offender and part of their government identification number on large LED screens above the pavement

ASSANGE LOSES INTERNET, VISITOR PRIVILEGES AT ECUADORAN EMBASSY

Ecuadoran Government Severs Internet, Accuses WikiLeaks Founder Of Breaching Written Agreement

WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange lost his internet access and visitor privileges Wednesday at the Ecuadoran Embassy in London. In a statement from the Ecuadorian government, Assange is accused of breaching a written commitment signed at the end of 2017 concerning interference with other nations. “The Government of Ecuador warns that the behavior of Assange, with its messages through social networks, puts at risk the good relations that the country maintains with the United Kingdom, with the rest of the States of the European Union and other nations,” a translated section of the announcement says. The statement, which says the action is intended to “prevent potential damage,” does not detail how long Assange’s privileges will be revoked.

Ecuador took similar action by severing Assange’s internet access in 2016 after WikiLeaks began publishing documents related to the 2016 election.

“The Government of Ecuador respects the principle of non-intervention in the internal affairs of other states,” an statement said. “It does not interfere in external electoral processes, nor does it favor any particular candidate.”

NEW ORGAN DISCOVERED IN HUMAN BODY

Compartments May Act As “Shock Absorbers” That Protect Body From Damage

Scientists have identified a new human organ hiding in plain sight. **The discovery they hope could help them understand the spread of cancer within the body.** Layers long thought to be dense, connective tissue are actually a series of fluid-filled compartments researchers have termed the “interstitium.” These compartments are found beneath the skin, as well as lining the gut, lungs, blood vessels and muscles, and join together to form a network supported by a mesh of strong, flexible proteins. New analysis published in the journal *Scientific Reports* is the first to identify these spaces collectively as a new organ and try to understand their function. Remarkably, the interstitium had previously gone unnoticed despite being one of the largest organs in the human body.

The compartments may act as “shock absorbers” that protect body tissues from damage. Mount Sinai Beth Israel Medical Center medics Dr David Carr-Locke and Dr Petros Benias came across the interstitium while investigating a patient’s bile duct, searching for signs of cancer. They noticed cavities that did not match any previously known human anatomy, and approached New York University pathologist Dr Neil Theise to ask for his expertise. The researchers realized traditional methods for examining body tissues had missed the interstitium because the “fixing” method for assembling medical microscope slides involves draining away fluid – therefore destroying the organ’s structure. Instead of their true identity as body wide, fluid-filled shock absorbers, the squashed cells had been overlooked and considered a simple layer of connective tissue.

China has brought [surveillance of its citizens to new levels, using face recognition technology.](#)

A woman jaywalked, thinking nothing of it. The police demanded her identity card, but she didn't have it. They snapped her picture and promptly pulled up her identity and her personal history.

This incident was but a small indicator of China's determination to monitor its people.

"Mao Yan's Shenzhen is part of one of the great social experiments of mankind — the use of massive amounts of data, combined with facial recognition technology, shaming and artificial intelligence to control a population via marriage of the state and private companies. Already on the packed highways of Shanghai, honking has decreased. That's because directional microphones coupled with high-definition cameras can identify and ticket — again, via WeChat — noisy drivers and display their names, photographs and identity card numbers on the city's many LED boards. On some streets, if drivers stop their cars by the side of the road longer than seven minutes, high-definition cameras identify the driver and, again, issue him or her an instant ticket...

"But as Mao Yan's story makes clear, this technology is bleeding into the rest of China, where 95 percent of the population is Han Chinese. And China's authorities won't be content with traffic stops. Their goal is behavioral modification on a massive scale. Chinese planners have announced their intention to tap the vast AI and surveillance infrastructure currently under construction to generate "social credit" scores for all of China's 1.5 billion people. With a high score, traveling, securing a loan, buying a car and other benefits will be easy to come by. Run afoul of the authorities, and problems begin. Some Chinese businessmen who are benefiting from this massive investment in data have argued that the Chinese are less concerned about privacy than people in the United States. Robin Li, the founder of Baidu, China's version of Google, which routinely shares its data with the Chinese Communist Party, argued over the weekend that Chinese

people don't care that much about privacy. "The Chinese people are more open or less sensitive about the privacy issue," said Li, speaking at the China Development Forum in Beijing. "If they are able to trade privacy for convenience, safety and efficiency, in a lot of cases, they are willing to do that." Ironically, Li's remarks were released by the Chinese magazine Caixin on the same day that Facebook's Mark Zuckerberg issued an apology for releasing user data to a political consultancy. In her article, Mao Yan didn't seem to agree with Li's optimistic interpretation of the campaign. "Maybe," she wrote, "it's intimidation to make everyone afraid." I think she's right. Hours after Mao Yan posted her story on China's Internet, censors took it down."

We should never normalize the invasion of privacy.

That's why I left Facebook. So did Elon Musk.

The protection of privacy—some basic human dignity—should concern us all.

Shake-Ups on Trump's Team: President Trump is replacing National-Security Adviser H.R. McMaster with John Bolton, a former United Nations ambassador who's advocated for military action against North Korea. [Here's what that means.](#) Earlier in the day, Trump's personal lawyer John Dowd announced [he's stepping down](#) from the president's legal team in the Russia case. Dowd's decision comes less than a year after Trump's last lawyer resigned.

Trouble With Trade: Trump announced significant tariffs on Chinese imports as a result of an investigation into Chinese trading practices that hurt U.S. firms. Although the president may be right to want to punish unfair trading, he might also be [starting a trade war that he can't win.](#) Meanwhile in Europe, some of the unintended consequences of Brexit include [serious disruptions](#) to the lives of many residents, as well as a new British passport [that will be produced in France.](#)

The Wake of Violence: In Austin, Texas, the suspect in a deadly series of bombings blew himself up on Wednesday, and the crimes' long-term effect on his community **may be just beginning**. The surge of activism since the shooting in Parkland, Florida, prompted Congress to add some provisions to its omnibus spending bill that take steps toward **reducing gun violence**, although the measures fall short of what advocates had hoped for.

From Vulindlela, South Africa, Olga Khazan reports on the relationships between young women and older men known as “blessers”:

In a country where two-thirds of people **under age 25 are unemployed**, some poor South African women and teens date older, wealthier men, who provide them with everything from food to hairpieces to school uniforms. In exchange, the men demand discreet, often condom-free sex. At the same time, many of these young women maintain more egalitarian relationships with boys their own age. Some of the sugar daddies, as these men are also sometimes called, infect the girls with HIV. When those teen girls reach adulthood, they find husbands and pass their HIV onto them. Those husbands, in turn, become the next crop of sugar daddies, infecting the next generation of teen girls and perpetuating the cycle.

This cycle of contagion, researchers are finding, is driven not only by economics and culture but also by the human body's own microbes.

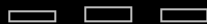

For much of 2018 teacher salaries have been front-page news as teachers in West Virginia led protracted efforts, involving walk-outs and strikes, to obtain a long-awaited raise. Fast on their heels, teachers in Oklahoma and other states are considering the same, heartened by their cross-country colleagues who may have touched off "a national movement that could have lasting implications for the country's schools," [per the Atlantic](#).

Last summer, EdSurge did some pretty heavy number crunching, comparing cost-of-living-data with average teacher salaries in an effort [to find the nexus of affordable living and high pay](#) (It's...Michigan). On the obverse: a clutch of states, including West Virginia and Hawaii, which provide greater challenges for teachers looking to make ends meet. Arizona, another state whose teachers are protesting low pay, ranked near the bottom of our list.

This sort of data comparison is an inexact science, but a useful one nonetheless, and perhaps an instructive lesson for the teachers and education policymakers of tomorrow.

For much of 2018 teacher salaries have been front-page news as teachers in West Virginia led protracted efforts, involving walk-outs and strikes, to obtain a long-awaited raise. Fast on their heels, teachers in Oklahoma and other states are considering the same, heartened by their cross-country colleagues who may have touched off “a national movement that could have lasting implications for the country’s schools,” [per the Atlantic](#).

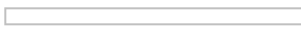

[TSA sets new firearm discovery record](#)

TSA discovered a record breaking 104 firearms in carry-on bags around the United States from 5 through 11 February. The previous record of ninety-six firearms was set in July of 2017. Of the 104 firearms discovered, 87 were loaded

and 38 had a round chambered. Firearm possession laws vary by state and locality. TSA says that the agency may impose civil penalties of up to \$13,066 per violation per person for prohibited items violations and violations of other TSA regulations. How the Fix NICS act could strengthen the gun background check system

After a weekend of protests and vigils following the massacre at a Florida high school that left 17 dead, President Donald Trump signaled support on Monday for bipartisan legislation aimed at improving records reporting to the federal gun background check system. Launched in 1998, the FBI's National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) is used by federally licensed firearms dealers to check whether a person who is trying to buy a gun is legally permitted to do so. The gun background check system is only as strong as the records it contains. States voluntarily supply records to the databases that make up the NICS system, and they do a spotty job of it. Some records never make it into the databases, and others are incomplete or unclear.

The Russia connection: 7 February Syria attack

Financier of Russian troll farm supporting Trump funds anti-U.S. paramilitaries in Syria

Yevgeniy Prigozhin is a close ally of Vladimir Putin and the financial backer of the St. Petersburg-based troll farm known as the Internet Research Agency (IRA). The IRA has been at the center of the Kremlin's disinformation campaign which was launched in 2014 to sow discord and deepen polarization and conflict in the United States (and other Western democracies) – and which, in 2016, changed focus to help Donald Trump win the Republican nomination and then the White House. According to U.S. intelligence, a Prigozhin-financed paramilitary group of Russian mercenaries attacked U.S. troops and their allies in Syria earlier this month. Prigozhin was in close touch with Putin and senior aides to Assad in the days and weeks before and after the assault.

Pentagon says U.S. was told no Russians involved in Syria attack

The Pentagon says U.S. military commanders were told by their Russian counterparts that there were no Russians in a paramilitary force whose attack on a base in eastern Syria earlier this month led to a massive counterstrike by U.S. forces. Up to a 100 Russians were killed in the attack, which was conducted by the Wagner Group, a paramilitary firm based in southern Russia and financed by Yevgeniy Prigozhin, a close Putin ally who owns the St. Petersburg troll farm Internet Research Agency. Senior U.S. intelligence officials told ABC News that Prigozhin's connection to the Wagner Group is important, as his private military work offers more evidence that he is

pursuing Vladimir Putin's global ambitions while providing the Russian leader some deniability that the actions are officially sanctioned.

Social media is helping Putin kill our democracy

For this, we have the Internet to thank. While none can deny the countless benefits of the online age, this is one of its most pernicious side effects. It's time the West seriously addressed the problem, and quickly, since this Kremlin spy game isn't going away.

Fake news “vaccine”: online game may “inoculate” by simulating propaganda tactics

A new experiment, just launched online, aims to help “inoculate” against disinformation by providing a small dose of perspective from a “fake news tycoon.” The game encourages players to stoke anger, mistrust and fear in the public by manipulating digital news and social media within the simulation. Players build audiences for their fake news sites by publishing polarizing falsehoods, deploying twitter bots, photo-shopping evidence, and inciting conspiracy theories in the wake of public tragedy – all while maintaining a “credibility score” to remain as persuasive as possible. The psychological theory behind the research is called “inoculation”: “A biological vaccine administers a small dose of the disease to build immunity. Similarly, inoculation theory suggests that exposure to a weak or demystified version of an argument makes it easier to refute when confronted with more persuasive claims,” says a researcher.

Cuban mystery

21 U.S. diplomats in Cuba suffered “acquired brain injury from an exposure of unknown origin”: Experts

In late 2016, U.S. government personnel in Havana, Cuba, visited the embassy medical unit after experiencing unusual sound and sensory phenomena and the onset of neurological symptoms. Researchers who examined the twenty-one

diplomats say that concussion-like symptoms were observed in the 11 women and 10 men after they reported hearing intensely loud sounds in their homes and hotel rooms and feeling changes in air pressure caused by an unknown source. The symptoms were consistent with brain injury, although there was no history of head trauma. The experts who examined the American diplomats concluded: “The unique circumstances of these patients and the clinical manifestations detailed in this report raise concern about a new mechanism for possible acquired brain injury from an exposure of unknown origin.”

A new report by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine proposes a framework for evaluating proposals to provide authorized government agencies with access to unencrypted versions of encrypted communications and other data. The framework is the product of an 18-month study led by a diverse array of leaders from law enforcement, computer science, civil liberties, law, and other disciplines.

Quicker response to airborne radiological threats

Researchers have developed a new technique that uses existing technologies to detect potential airborne radiological materials in hours instead of days. at present, emergency responders who are characterizing potential radiological risk need to take an air sample and ship it to a radiochemistry lab after preliminary screening analysis. The process means it can take days or weeks to get quality results that authorities can use to make informed decisions.

Bill to jump-start universal flu vaccine efforts

As the nation grapples with a long and unrelenting flu season rivaling by some measures the 2009 H1N1 pandemic, a group of U.S. senators last week unveiled a proposal to invest \$1 billion in research over the next 5 years to create a universal flu vaccine that would provide lifetime protection against a range of

influenza strains. The announcement came just as U.S. researchers released an interim report card on the flu vaccine's performance so far this season, which again showed disappointingly low effectiveness against H3N2, this season's dominant strain.

Working to halt outbreaks in 60 days or less

The increasing threat of infectious diseases is intensifying the need for breakthrough technologies and capabilities to protect first responders and equip them with therapeutics that can halt the impact of infectious agents. Current approaches for recent public health emergencies due to infectious diseases have not produced effective preventive or therapeutic solutions in a relevant timescale. Examples from recent outbreaks such as H3N2 (flu), Ebola, and Zika viruses highlight the significant lag in deployment and efficacy of life-saving solutions. To address the growing threat from infectious diseases as well as to properly equip DoD Service members who regularly deploy worldwide to provide assistance in all manner of high-risk environments, DARPA launched the Pandemic Prevention Platform program (P3). DARPA notes that quickly produced nucleic-acid-based technologies may hold key to body creating protective antibodies.

U.S. seeks to boost domestic production of 35 critical minerals

The U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI) last week announced it was seeking public comment by 19 March 2018 on a draft list of minerals considered critical to the economic and national security of the United States. The draft list of minerals that DOI published last week as critical to the United States includes thirty-five mineral commodities. A “critical mineral” is a mineral identified to be a non-fuel mineral or mineral material essential to the economic and national security of the United States, the supply chain of which is vulnerable to disruption, and that serves an essential function in the manufacturing of a product, the absence of which would have significant consequences for the economy or national security.

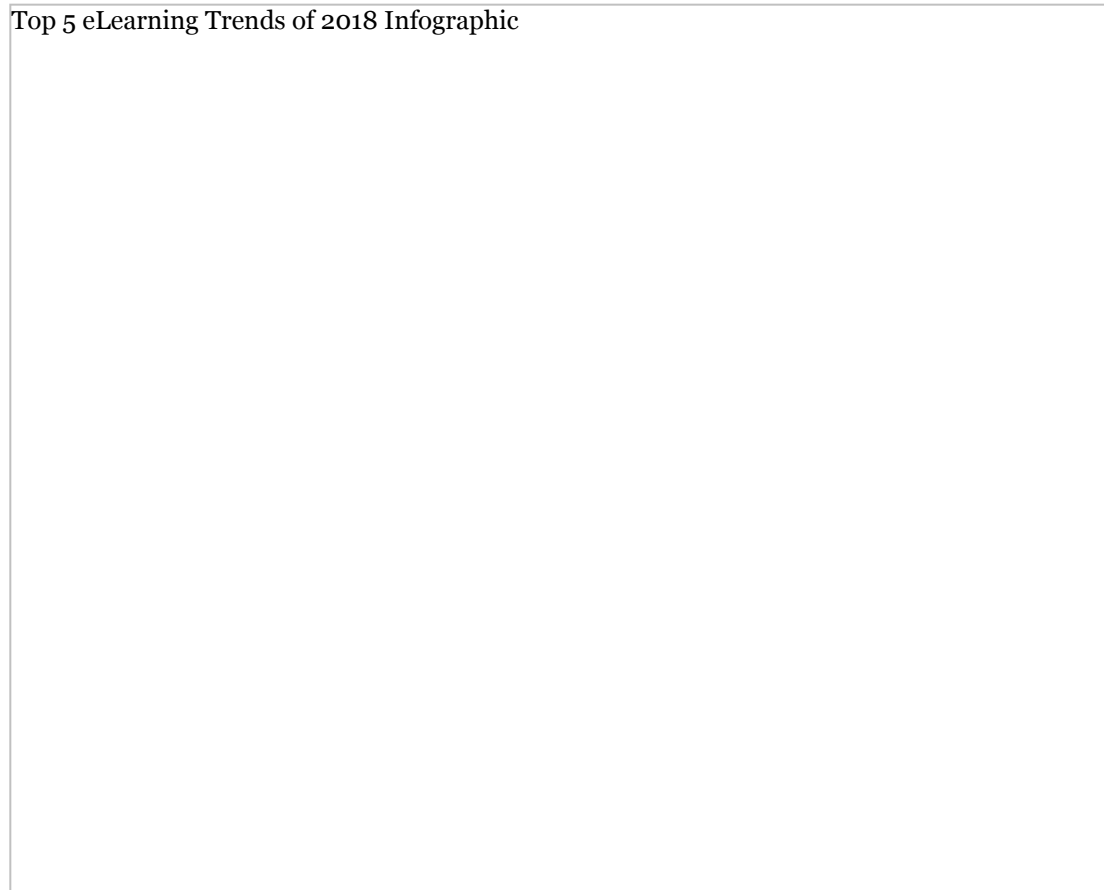

Dem. leaders want \$300 million for FBI, DHS to protect U.S. election from Russia

The Democratic leaders in the Senate and House on Wednesday sent a letter to Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-Kentucky) and Speaker of the House Paul Ryan (R-Wisconsin), demanding that \$300 million be given to the FBI and DHS so they can thwart more meddling by foreign powers. The letter urges state and local governments to bolster their defense against cyberattacks, including the replacement of outdated voter registration and voting systems, after the FBI and DHS confirmed that Russian government operatives, in 2016, tried to attack these components of the U.S. election system in twenty-one states.

Election security a high priority — until it comes to paying for new voting machines

Local election administrators across the country face new problems and threats. But their budgets for new voting equipment remain inadequate. Analysis of voting machines found that over two-thirds of counties in America used machines for the 2016 election that are over a decade old. In most jurisdictions, the same equipment will be used in the 2018 election. In a recent nationwide survey by the Brennan Center for Justice, election officials in 33 states reported needing to replace their voting equipment by 2020. Officials complain the machines are difficult to maintain and susceptible to crashes and failure, problems that lead to long lines and other impediments in voting and, they fear, a sense among voters that the system itself is untrustworthy.

How the Fix NICS act could strengthen the gun background check system

After a weekend of protests and vigils following the massacre at a Florida high school that left 17 dead, President Donald Trump signaled support on Monday for bipartisan legislation aimed at improving records reporting to the federal gun background check system. Launched in 1998, the FBI's National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS) is used by federally licensed firearms dealers to check whether a person who is trying to buy a gun is legally permitted to do so. The gun background check system is only as strong as the records it contains. States voluntarily supply records to the databases that make up the NICS system, and they do a spotty job of it. Some records never make it into the databases, and others are incomplete or unclear.

APT37 (Reaper): Overlooked North Korean cyber espionage unit

An increasingly sophisticated North Korean cyber-espionage unit is using its skills to widen spying operations to aerospace and defense industries, a new study has revealed. Cybersecurity firm FireEye has identified a North Korean group, which it names APT37 (Reaper) and which it says is using malware to infiltrate computer networks. FireEye's report suggests the group has been active since 2012, but has now graduated to the level of an advanced persistent threat.

Quicker response to airborne radiological threats

Researchers have developed a new technique that uses existing technologies to detect potential airborne radiological materials in hours instead of days. At present, emergency responders who are characterizing potential radiological risk need to take an air sample and ship it to a radiochemistry lab after preliminary screening analysis. The process means it can take days or weeks to get quality results that authorities can use to make informed decisions.

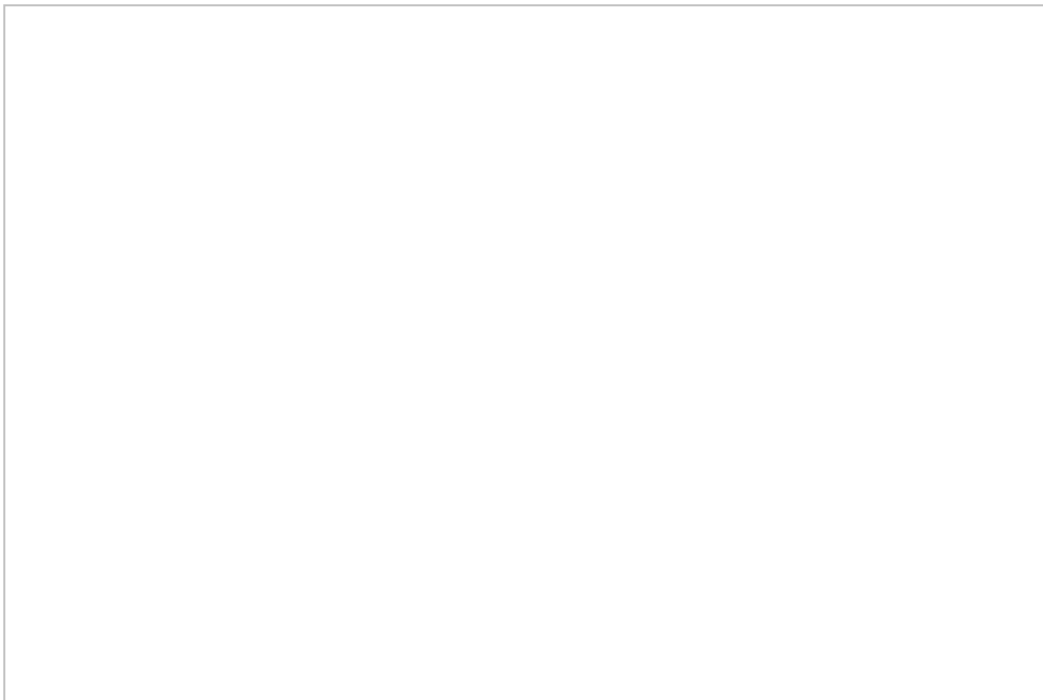
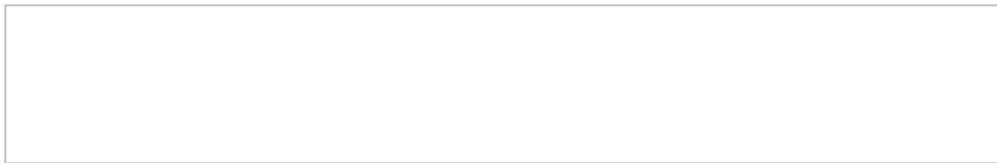

CHINESE POLICE BEGIN USING FACIAL RECOGNITION SUNGLASSES TO FIND

We Can Match Every Face With An ID Card And Trace All Your Movements Back One Week In Time

Police in China have begun using sunglasses equipped with facial recognition technology in order to wanted suspects. The new tool, given to officers in Central China's Henan Province, has reportedly led to the arrest of more than 30 people at the Zhengzhou East Railway Station since Thursday. China News Service, state-owned news agency says, 7 kidnapping and hit-and-run suspects as well as 26 individuals accused using fake IDs were arrested after being identified with the technology. He didn't think that he would have to be dealing with this kind of ***over government oppression and persecution simply for preaching the gospel on a public sidewalk here in the United States***. In the last 6 months, criminal charges have been brought against public evangelists in California, Nevada, Washington, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Michigan."

A Second Family Is Suing A Texas School District, Claiming Their Son Was Raped More Than 30 Times During Sports Team Events — The Coaches Did Nothing To Stop It

The complaint alleges that a boy, listed as John Doe, was sexually assaulted more than 30 times between October 2016 and February 2017 in the La Vernia High School locker room, a shower at the school, during basketball practice, at other schools' gyms, before and after basketball games, and after dinners at other families' homes. Now, a new family has filed a lawsuit against the school district, claiming that a La Vernia coach witnessed and ignored 2 violent sexual assaults suffered by their son while he was on his basketball team. All the while, according to the documents, Doe says he was threatened by teammates between assaults that they were "going to get you." In February of last year, a La Vernia student told local police he was sexually assaulted by varsity athletes. Ultimately, police found that the abuse perpetrated by players on the high school's baseball, football, and basketball teams — targeted at least 10 victims and spanned more than 3 years. Varsity players on all 3 teams were accused of sodomizing younger teammates with baseball bats, flashlights, and carbon-dioxide tanks. A total of 13 students — 6 of them legally considered adults — were arrested and charged with either sexual assault or sexual assault of a child. The full scale of the assaults is not yet publicly known, but it has roiled the tiny town about 30 miles southeast of San Antonio. The Texas Rangers and the State Attorney General's Office have said the investigation is ongoing.

The newspaper could potentially succumb to political pressure

Laura Halminien from Finland's largest daily newspaper is drawing international attention, especially as it occurred in a country known for its protection of press freedoms. The journalist published a bombshell investigative report based on previously leaked documents connected to a Finnish intelligence operation which closely monitors Russian military movements just across the border in the St. Petersburg region. The report gave details of a Finnish Defense Intelligence Agency **secretive facilities** and ongoing operations regarding surveillance of Russia, with special focus on a signals surveillance complex in the city of Tikkakoski in central Finland. The Tikkakoski complex is said use a high tech and advanced monitoring system to observe Russian military maneuvers based on electromagnetic radiation. Finnish police searched the reporter's home and seized her computer after she tried to destroy the hard drive to protect sources linked to the security story. She tried to smash up her computer with a hammer in her home, but the laptop started smoking and she called the fire brigade, according to an interview published by her employer Helsingin Sanomat. Police officers came to her home with the fire service to investigate the blaze then took her computer and searched her property.

In a subsequent interview with her newspaper Halminen said that she "wanted to destroy the computer ensure that the source of the information is well-protected." According to the Helsinki Times, the investigative story – which was the first installment in a planned series on the sensitive program – is about much more than a spy operation targeting Russia, but about Finland's domestic spy capabilities. The main reason behind publishing the article and exposing the classified documents now is the new bill being prepared for the Finnish parliament to give this facility and other **security police agencies authority to survey internet communications inside the country**. The article includes images of documents with "Top Secret" stamped on the top, from 1999.

With AI-Augmented Brainpower The Chinese Navy Would Have An Advantage In Underwater War

China is working on the development of artificial intelligence (AI) systems that would enhance the thinking capabilities of commanding officers of nuclear submarines, a senior scientist, who was a part of the project, said. The scientist, who asked to remain anonymous due to the sensitivity of the project, said by updating the old systems and providing nuclear submarines with AI-augmented brainpower, the Chinese navy would have an advantage in underwater wars. It would also result in the progress of AI technology, he added. The scientist said, "Though a submarine has enormous power of destruction, its brain is actually quite small." Speaking to the South China Morning Post, he said although the operation of a nuclear submarine depends on the efficiency of the crew's performance, novel challenges posed by the demands of modern warfare could result in new variables that would make the operations even easier to perform.

Body Brokers Rely On Lax Regulations To Export Heads, Shoulders, Knees And Toe To Mexico, China, Venezuela And Saudi Arabia

Exporting companies are using Chinese ships, planes, and trucks to transport dead Americans across the world for research purposes, according to a report from Reuters. A Hong Kong flagged cargo ship departed South Carolina in July carrying 6,000 pounds of human remains valued at \$67,204. The container's temperature was set to 5 degrees Fahrenheit to prevent the parts from spoiling. Relatives of the dead, meanwhile, did not realize their loved ones' remains were being dismembered and sent to Europe and elsewhere, the report notes. Body brokers like Oregon-based MedCure rely on lax regulations to export heads, shoulders, knees and toes to Mexico, China, Venezuela and Saudi Arabia, among several other countries. Plastic surgeons in Germany use heads to practice new techniques, while thousands of parts are shipped overseas annually. "There are people who wouldn't necessarily mind where the specimens were sent if they were fully informed," Brandi Schmitt, who directs a body donation system at the University of California, told reporters about the trade. Families of those on in the ships were shocked to hear that their husbands, fathers, and daughters were shipped overseas. Marie Gallegos, whose husband's head was shipped to a dental school in Israel months after he died of a heart attack, told reporters that she "should have read the fine print" of the forms she signed allowing his parts to be donated for science and research.

FBI investigators raided the warehouse of another so-called Body Broker last year and found a grisly discovery. Court papers reveal the building, owned and operated by businessman Arthur Rathburn, was littered with dead flies, dog bowls, and human remains frozen together in huge "chunks." A jury ultimately found Rathburn guilty of fraud for supplying his customers with body parts infected with HIV and hepatitis. The fraud scheme shocked even the most experienced of our investigative team.

\$3,500 And A Plane Ticket To Africa Or Jail Time

Israel has started handing out notices to 20,000 male African migrants giving them 2 months to leave the country or risk being thrown in jail. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government is offering the migrants, most of whom are from Sudan and Eritrea, \$3,500 and a plane ticket to what it says is a safe destination in another country in sub-Saharan Africa. The fate of some 37,000 Africans in Israel is posing a moral dilemma for a state founded as haven for Jews from persecution and a national home. The right-wing government is under pressure from its nationalist voter base to expel the migrants, while others are calling for them to be taken in. The government says the migrants are "infiltrators" looking for work rather than asylum, but there is a growing liberal backlash against the plan, including from rabbis, a small group of survivors of the Nazi Holocaust and ordinary people who say Israel should show greater compassion to the migrants.

Israel has been lax in cracking down on these call centers, despite the fact the Paris prosecutor said last year that French citizens had lost 4.5 billion euros to such fraudsters, many operating from Israel, since 2010. A Swedish Bishop has responded to an application to have the Muslim call to prayer broadcast in the immigrant suburb of Araby, Växjö by welcoming the move as a positive sign of multiculturalism. "Muslims are not visitors in Växjö, we live here," said Imam Ismail Abu Helal. Fredrik Modéus, the Bishop of Växjö endorsed the proposal. "It is natural in a multicultural and multi-religious society that different traditions and religions are heard, are visible and are interacting for a good society," said Modéus in a statement, adding, "I therefore welcome the application for call to prayer." The Bishop said the call to prayer was no different to church bells

and should be embraced. The application is likely to be granted because others have already been approved in Stockholm. This means that the call to prayer, known as the adzhan, which is broadcast 5 times a day in Islamic countries via loudspeakers and usually begins with the refrain "Allahu Akbar" will soon ring out across Swedish towns and cities. Respondents to the Bishop's statement were not so positive. "Maybe the next step will be that the Church of Sweden adapts to Sharia law as well?" asked one. That last remark is prescient given that the Swedish Church is set to lose one million members over the next 10 years and is being forced to sell properties to make ends meet. Another Swedish Bishop expressed her desire to see Christian symbols removed to make churches "more inviting" for Muslims. ***Eva Brunne, who is the first openly lesbian bishop of a mainstream church in the world, wants the church to be treated more like a public airport***, where prayer rooms are made available to Muslims, by removing Christian symbols and "marking the direction of Mecca."

✚ GREECE AND TURKEY ENERGY DISPUTE COULD SPARK CONFLICT

Territorial Disputes In The Eastern Mediterranean Basin Continue

The eastern Mediterranean is expected to witness the first conflict of 2018, as worsening relationships between Turkey and the Greek Cypriot–Greece–Israel–Egypt bloc. Territorial disputes over natural gas and newly discovered hydrocarbon reserves in the eastern Mediterranean basin are the reason. Up until a few years ago, the hope was that these hydrocarbon reserves would offer a real opportunity for a peaceful settlement of the Cyprus conflict. These optimistic hopes vanished with both Turks and Greek Cypriots unilaterally speeding up exploration and drilling operations. In 2004, the European Union had declared the Greek Cypriots the sole entity representing the island of Cyprus and accepted it as an EU member. Feeling that its hand has been strengthened following the EU decision, the Greek Cypriots claimed the right of natural resources exploration in the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) around Cyprus. Turkey, however, has been insisting that the Greek Cypriot administration in Nicosia cannot unilaterally "adopt laws regarding the exploitation of natural resources on behalf of the entire island," as it doesn't represent the Turkish Cypriots. Moreover, Italy, Greece, Greek Cypriot and Israel had already agreed on the construction of a gas pipeline from newly discovered fields. The project — dubbed "East–Med" — will cost some \$6 billion. An over 1,243 mile long pipeline will channel offshore reserves in the Levantine basin to Greece and Italy. The East–Med project could be interpreted as an effort to form a regional alliance between Greek Cyprus and Greece to confront Turkey in the eastern Mediterranean. The Greek Cypriots and Greece also signed a separate agreement with Israel to channel natural gas reserves in the Mediterranean basin via an undersea pipeline. Italy's participation in this project didn't come as a surprise, as Italy has already been exploring natural gas in the Mediterranean on behalf of the Greeks.

News Short Briefs

- Ex–student killed 17 people and 15 injured at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, on Wednesday.
- Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has claimed that billionaire George Soros is funding efforts to oppose the country's plan to deport thousands of African migrants – an accusation that the philanthropist denies.
- A Kim Jong–un impersonator trolled North Korea at the Winter Olympics Wednesday during a hockey match in Gangneung, South Korea. The lookalike, who later identified himself as

"Howard," was seen walking past North Korea's cheerleaders while dancing, smiling and waving a Korean unification flag. Members of the cheer squad appeared to look on in disgust as security officials descended on the scene.

- A Tennessee woman, Betty Jean Jordan, aged 75, was arrested for distributing opioid from her home in Parsons, Decatur County, TN. The police authorities, dubbed her "Kingpin Granny" Decatur County Sheriff officials said Jordan was selling prescription drugs.
- Mitt Romney launched his Utah Senate campaign with a low key announcement on social media, and his first public appearance near Salt Lake City with a keynote address to a gathering of grassroots Republicans.
- George Soros has already spent just under \$70,000 backing a primary challenge to Bexar County District Attorney Nicholas LaHood, according to campaign finance documents. LaHood is a Democrat who opposes sanctuary cities. He says he supports Texas Gov. Greg Abbott's crackdown on cities that defy federal immigration law.
- A top U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement lawyer in Seattle has been accused of stealing identities from immigrants. Raphael Sanchez, ICE's chief counsel for the western Washington field office, was caught using his work email to send a Chinese immigrant's personal information — including a permanent residency card and passport — to his personal account.
- Retiring GOP Rep. Trey Gowdy (S.C.) said Wednesday that part of the reason he is leaving Congress is that he likes "jobs where facts matter." Gowdy, the chairman of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, announced last month that he would not seek reelection and would return to a career in the justice system.
- President Trump donated his fourth-quarter 2017 paycheck to the Department of Transportation, demonstrating his commitment to public infrastructure. Press Secretary Sarah Sanders presented the \$100,000 check to Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao who said the funds would go to the department's INFRA (Infrastructure For Rebuilding America) Grant Programs.
- More than 20 refugee resettlement offices are slated to close and dozens of others will scale back operations after the Trump administration called for fewer refugees to be admitted to the U.S. The State Department has informed refugee resettlement agencies that the maximum number of refugees admitted will decrease from 110,000 to 45,000 this year. As a result, there is no longer a need for all of the 324 resettlement offices that were operating at the end of 2017.
- Some Colorado state lawmakers say if Congress won't reform the immigration system, they will. Legislation is under discussion in the state Capitol to give Colorado its own version of a green card, called a purple card. The bill would allow anyone who has paid state taxes for at least 2 years and has not had a felony in 3 years to be eligible for legal status.

CHINESE POLICE BEGIN USING FACIAL RECOGNITION SUNGLASSES TO FIND SUSPECTS

We Can Match Every Face With An ID Card And Trace All Your Movements Back One Week In Time

Police in China have begun using sunglasses equipped with facial recognition technology in order to wanted suspects. The new tool, given to officers in Central China's Henan Province, has reportedly led to the arrest of more than 30 people at the Zhengzhou East Railway Station since Thursday. China News Service, state-owned news agency says, 7 kidnapping and hit-and-run suspects as well as 26 individuals accused using fake IDs were arrested after being identified with the technology. Zhang also revealed that the new technology works effectively with only one image opposed to previous tools that required multiple pictures from numerous angles. Charges have been dropped against a quintet of street preachers in Washington State. The 5 street preachers were cited by police for disturbing public peace outside of Washougal High School in November 2017. "All he did was he held a sign with a Bible verse, handed out gospel tracts to students and told them Jesus loves you and this aggressive action by the school and by the police remind him of similar harassment in Russia. He didn't think that he would have to be dealing with this kind of ***over government oppression and persecution simply for preaching the gospel on a public sidewalk here in the United States***. In the last 6 months, criminal charges have been brought against public evangelists in California, Nevada, Washington, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Michigan."

♂ HIGH-SCHOOL COACH IGNORED BOY'S SCREAMS AS TEAMMATES RAPE HIM

A Second Family Is Suing A Texas School District, Claiming Their Son Was Raped More Than 30 Times During Sports Team Events — The Coaches Did Nothing To Stop It

The complaint alleges that a boy, listed as John Doe, was sexually assaulted more than 30 times between October 2016 and February 2017 in the La Vernia High School locker room, a shower at the school, during basketball practice, at other schools' gyms, before and after basketball games, and after dinners at other families' homes. Now, a new family has filed a lawsuit against the school district, claiming that a La Vernia coach witnessed and ignored 2 violent sexual assaults suffered by their son while he was on his basketball team. All the while, according to the documents, Doe says he was threatened by teammates between assaults that they were "going to get you." In February of last year, a La Vernia student told local police he was sexually assaulted by varsity athletes. Ultimately, police found that the abuse perpetrated by players on the high school's baseball, football, and basketball teams — targeted at least 10 victims and spanned more than 3 years. Varsity players on all 3 teams were accused of sodomizing younger teammates with baseball bats, flashlights, and carbon-dioxide tanks. A total of 13 students — 6 of them legally considered adults — were arrested and charged with either sexual assault or sexual assault of a child. The full scale of the assaults is not yet publicly known, but it has roiled the tiny town about 30 miles southeast of San Antonio. The Texas Rangers and the State Attorney General's Office have said the investigation is ongoing.

If School District Wins That Means Public Schools Will Be Able To Censor Students' Speech

A legal battle over cheerleaders and their Bible verse banners continues in the courts. Last week, the Kountze Independent School District (KISD) filed another petition to the Texas Supreme Court to ban high school football cheerleaders from displaying banners that feature Bible verses. First Liberty attorney Chel Youman says her organization helped the cheerleaders win an early victory in a federal appeals court. "We won before at the Texas Supreme Court on one of the main issues and they sent it back down to the court of appeals," she recalls. If the school district wins at the Texas Supreme Court, Youman says that means public schools will be able to censor their own student's speech.

She tried to smash up her computer with a hammer in her home, but the laptop started smoking and she called the fire brigade, according to an interview published by her employer Helsingin Sanomat. Police officers came to her home with the fire service to investigate the blaze then took her computer and searched her property.

In a subsequent interview with her newspaper Halminen said that she "wanted to destroy the computer ensure that the source of the information is well-protected." According to the Helsinki Times, the investigative story – which was the first installment in a planned series on the sensitive program – is about much more than a spy operation targeting Russia, but about Finland's domestic spy capabilities. The main reason behind publishing the article and exposing the classified documents now is the new bill being prepared for the Finnish parliament to give this facility and other **security police agencies authority to survey internet communications inside the country**. The article includes images of documents with "Top Secret" stamped on the top, from 1999.

China is working on the development of artificial intelligence (AI) systems that would enhance the thinking capabilities of commanding officers of nuclear submarines, a senior scientist, who was a part of the project, said. The scientist, who asked to remain anonymous due to the sensitivity of the project, said by updating the old systems and providing nuclear submarines with AI-augmented brainpower, the Chinese navy would have an advantage in underwater wars. It would also result in the progress of AI technology, he added. The scientist said, "Though a submarine has enormous power of destruction, its brain is actually quite small." Speaking to the South China Morning Post, he said although the operation of a nuclear submarine depends on the efficiency of the crew's performance, novel challenges posed by the demands of modern warfare could result in new variables that would make the operations even easier to perform.

🔪 CHINESE TANKER HAD A CONTAINER FULL OF DEAD AMERICANS

Body Brokers Rely On Lax Regulations To Export Heads, Shoulders, Knees And Toe To Mexico, China, Venezuela And Saudi Arabia

Exporting companies are using Chinese ships, planes, and trucks to transport dead Americans across the world for research purposes, according to a report from Reuters. A Hong Kong flagged cargo ship departed South Carolina in July carrying 6,000 pounds of human remains valued at \$67,204. The container's temperature was set to 5 degrees Fahrenheit to prevent the parts from spoiling. Relatives of the dead, meanwhile, did not realize their loved ones' remains were being dismembered and sent to Europe and elsewhere, the report notes. Body brokers like Oregon-based MedCure rely on lax regulations to export heads, shoulders, knees and toes to Mexico, China, Venezuela and Saudi Arabia, among several other countries. Plastic surgeons in Germany use heads to practice new techniques, while thousands of parts are shipped overseas annually. "There are people who wouldn't necessarily mind where the specimens were sent if they were fully informed," Brandi Schmitt, who directs a body donation system at the University of California, told reporters about the trade. Families of those on in the ships were shocked to hear that their husbands, fathers, and daughters were shipped overseas. Marie Gallegos, whose husband's head was shipped to a dental school in Israel months after he died of a heart attack, told reporters that she "should have read the fine print" of the forms she signed allowing his parts to be donated for science and research.

FBI investigators raided the warehouse of another so-called Body Broker last year and found a grisly discovery. Court papers reveal the building, owned and operated by businessman Arthur Rathburn, was littered with dead flies, dog bowls, and human remains frozen together in huge "chunks." A jury ultimately found Rathburn guilty of fraud for supplying his customers with body parts infected with HIV and hepatitis. The fraud scheme shocked even the most experienced of our investigative team.

Andersson told The Local she feels "very frustrated" and said "It's very aggravating to deal with school and everything going on at the same time. I wanted to study and get my degree and it feels that they don't want me to do that."

MAVNI Program Enabled Non-Citizens To Enlist And Obtain A Green Card For Their Services

Defense Secretary Jim Mattis said that young immigrants who enlisted in the military will not be deported even if their legal protection expires. Young immigrants who came to the country as children and were enlisted in the armed forces can now rest easy as their fears of deportation was assuaged by Mattis, who was reassured by the Secretary of Homeland Security Kirstjen Nielsen that military members and all veterans who were honorably discharged will be safe from deportation unless they have committed a serious felony or a judge had issued a specific deportation order for them. The MAVNI program created by George W. Bush in 2009, enabled non-citizens to enlist in the military and obtain a green card for their services to the country.

☆ **ISRAEL KICKS OFF DEPORTATION OF AFRICAN MIGRANTS**

\$3,500 And A Plane Ticket To Africa Or Jail Time

Israel has started handing out notices to 20,000 male African migrants giving them 2 months to leave the country or risk being thrown in jail. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's government is offering the migrants, most of whom are from Sudan and Eritrea, \$3,500 and a plane ticket to what it says is a safe destination in another country in sub-Saharan Africa. The fate of some 37,000 Africans in Israel is posing a moral dilemma for a state founded as haven for Jews from persecution and a national home. The right-wing government is under pressure from its nationalist voter base to expel the migrants, while others are calling for them to be taken in. The government says the migrants are "infiltrators" looking for work rather than asylum, but there is a growing liberal backlash against the plan, including from rabbis, a small group of survivors of the Nazi Holocaust and ordinary people who say Israel should show greater compassion to the migrants.

This means that the call to prayer, known as the adzhan, which is broadcast 5 times a day in Islamic countries via loudspeakers and usually begins with the refrain "Allahu Akbar" will soon ring out across Swedish towns and cities. Respondents to the Bishop's statement were not so positive. "Maybe the next step will be that the Church of Sweden adapts to Sharia law as well?" asked one. That last remark is prescient given that the Swedish Church is set to lose one million members over the next 10 years and is being forced to sell properties to make ends meet. Another Swedish Bishop expressed her desire to see Christian symbols removed to make churches "more inviting" for Muslims. ***Eva Brunne, who is the first openly lesbian bishop of a mainstream church in the world, wants the church to be treated more like a public airport***, where prayer rooms are made available to Muslims, by removing Christian symbols and "marking the direction of Mecca."

✚ GREECE AND TURKEY ENERGY DISPUTE COULD SPARK CONFLICT

Territorial Disputes In The Eastern Mediterranean Basin Continue

The eastern Mediterranean is expected to witness the first conflict of 2018, as worsening relationships between Turkey and the Greek Cypriot–Greece–Israel–Egypt bloc. Territorial disputes over natural gas and newly discovered hydrocarbon reserves in the eastern Mediterranean basin are the reason. Up until a few years ago, the hope was that these hydrocarbon reserves would offer a real opportunity for a peaceful settlement of the Cyprus conflict. These optimistic hopes vanished with both Turks and Greek Cypriots unilaterally speeding up exploration and drilling operations. In 2004, the European Union had declared the Greek Cypriots the sole entity representing the island of Cyprus and accepted it as an EU member. Feeling that its hand has been strengthened following the EU decision, the Greek Cypriots claimed the right of natural resources exploration in the Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ) around Cyprus. Turkey, however, has been insisting that the Greek Cypriot administration in Nicosia cannot unilaterally "adopt laws regarding the exploitation of natural resources on behalf of the entire island," as it doesn't represent the Turkish Cypriots. Moreover, Italy, Greece, Greek Cypriot and Israel had already agreed on the construction of a gas pipeline from newly discovered fields. The project — dubbed "East–Med" — will cost some \$6 billion. An over 1,243 mile long pipeline will channel offshore reserves in the Levantine basin to Greece and Italy. The East–Med project could be interpreted as an effort to form a regional alliance between Greek Cyprus and Greece to confront Turkey in the eastern Mediterranean. The Greek Cypriots and Greece also signed a separate agreement with Israel to channel natural gas reserves in the Mediterranean basin via an undersea pipeline. Italy's participation in this project didn't come as a surprise, as Italy has already been exploring natural gas in the Mediterranean on behalf of the Greeks.

News Short Briefs

- Ex–student killed 17 people and 15 injured at Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida, on Wednesday.
- Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has claimed that billionaire George Soros is funding efforts to oppose the country's plan to deport thousands of African migrants – an accusation that the philanthropist denies.
- A Kim Jong–un impersonator trolled North Korea at the Winter Olympics Wednesday during a hockey match in Gangneung, South Korea. The lookalike, who later identified himself as

"Howard," was seen walking past North Korea's cheerleaders while dancing, smiling and waving a Korean unification flag. Members of the cheer squad appeared to look on in disgust as security officials descended on the scene.

- A Tennessee woman, Betty Jean Jordan, aged 75, was arrested for distributing opioid from her home in Parsons, Decatur County, TN. The police authorities, dubbed her "Kingpin Granny" Decatur County Sheriff officials said Jordan was selling prescription drugs.
- Mitt Romney launched his Utah Senate campaign with a low key announcement on social media, and his first public appearance near Salt Lake City with a keynote address to a gathering of grassroots Republicans.
- George Soros has already spent just under \$70,000 backing a primary challenge to Bexar County District Attorney Nicholas LaHood, according to campaign finance documents. LaHood is a Democrat who opposes sanctuary cities. He says he supports Texas Gov. Greg Abbott's crackdown on cities that defy federal immigration law.
- A top U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement lawyer in Seattle has been accused of stealing identities from immigrants. Raphael Sanchez, ICE's chief counsel for the western Washington field office, was caught using his work email to send a Chinese immigrant's personal information — including a permanent residency card and passport — to his personal account.
- Retiring GOP Rep. Trey Gowdy (S.C.) said Wednesday that part of the reason he is leaving Congress is that he likes "jobs where facts matter." Gowdy, the chairman of the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, announced last month that he would not seek reelection and would return to a career in the justice system.
- President Trump donated his fourth-quarter 2017 paycheck to the Department of Transportation, demonstrating his commitment to public infrastructure. Press Secretary Sarah Sanders presented the \$100,000 check to Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao who said the funds would go to the department's INFRA (Infrastructure For Rebuilding America) Grant Programs.
- More than 20 refugee resettlement offices are slated to close and dozens of others will scale back operations after the Trump administration called for fewer refugees to be admitted to the U.S. The State Department has informed refugee resettlement agencies that the maximum number of refugees admitted will decrease from 110,000 to 45,000 this year. As a result, there is no longer a need for all of the 324 resettlement offices that were operating at the end of 2017.
- Some Colorado state lawmakers say if Congress won't reform the immigration system, they will. Legislation is under discussion in the state Capitol to give Colorado its own version of a green card, called a purple card. The bill would allow anyone who has paid state taxes for at least 2 years and has not had a felony in 3 years to be eligible for legal status.

3.3 inch display has a 1080p resolution and 450 nits of brightness, both of which are perfectly adequate for this size and type of computer. My only complaint is that it has a 16:9 aspect ratio — after using computers like Microsofts Surface line or the Google Pixelbook, which have 3:2 aspect displays, the 9 Pens feels like Im looking through a cramped tunnel.

The Notebook 9 Pen is the only computer Ive ever tested to offer both facial and fingerprint login options, and Im not

entirely sure why it does. Both are quick and work well, but the facial recognition system is the easier one to use, and I didn't use the fingerprint scanner outside of making sure it works.

As it's a 2 in 1, the Notebook 9 Pen's display can be flipped around into various tablet modes. Unfortunately, the extreme lightness of the base means that you can't open the computer with one hand — it's a two-hand operation to separate the two halves. And though the 9 Pen is very light, it's still clumsy to use as a tablet in your hand or lap, and is much better suited for use on a table or seat tray.

The Online Trust Alliance (OTA) has just released its *Cyber Incident & Breach Trends Report*. OTA's annual analysis found that cyber incidents targeting businesses nearly doubled from 82,000 in 2016 to 159,700 in 2017. Since the majority of cyber incidents are never reported, OTA believes the actual number in 2017 could easily exceed 350,000. The report analyzes data breaches, ransomware targeting businesses, business email compromise (BEC), distributed denial of service attacks (DDoS), and takeover of critical infrastructure and physical systems over the course of a year.

The West's adversaries “have become masters at exploiting the seams between peace and war. What constitutes a weapon in this grey area no longer has to go ‘bang’. Energy, cash - as bribes - corrupt business practices, cyber-attacks, assassination, fake news, propaganda and indeed military intimidation are all examples of the weapons used to gain advantage in this era of ‘constant competition,’ and the rules-based international architecture that has assured our stability and prosperity since 1945 is, I suggest therefore, threatened,” Sir Nicholas Carter, the British Army chief of staff, said last week. “The deduction we should draw from this is that there is no longer two clear and distinct states of ‘peace’ and ‘war’; we now have several forms. Indeed the character of war and peace is different for each of the contexts in which these ‘weapon systems’ are applied,” he added. “The arch exponent of this [new approach to war] is Russia.... I believe it represents the most complex and capable state-based threat to our country since the end of the Cold War. And my fellow Chiefs of Staff from the United States, France, and Germany shared this view.”

[Wanted: A firewall to protect U.S. elections](#)

As the FBI and Congress work to unravel Russia's hacking of the 2016 presidential election and learn whether anyone in Donald Trump's campaign supported the effort, one thing has become clear: U.S. elections are far more vulnerable to manipulation than was thought. A U.S. Department of Homeland Security warning and offer last year to help state election officials protect voter registration rolls, voting machines, and software from tampering was coolly received, perhaps out of skepticism or innate distrust of federal interference in a domain historically controlled by the states. Now, as federal and state officials are partnering to examine voting and election security, a new initiative at Harvard Kennedy School (HKS) is working to shore up another at-risk component of the U.S. election system: political campaigns.

One of ISIS's most notorious bomb-making videos is frequently and continually uploaded to Google web platforms, and there is little indication that the company is taking the appropriate steps to prevent these reuploads. "You Must Fight Them O Muwahhid" is one of ISIS's most infamous videos, urging attacks in the West, displaying knife attack tactics on a live human target, and notably, providing instructions for building an explosive device with easily obtainable materials.

Number of Muslim-Americans involved in terrorism continues to drop in 2017: Report

The annual report from the Triangle Center on Terrorism and Homeland Security documents a continuing decline in the number of Muslim-Americans associated with violent extremism in 2017. The total for the first year of the Trump administration continued a downward trend which was visible in the final year of the Obama administration. Muslim-American extremists have caused 140 deaths in more than 16 years since September 11, 2001. Over the same period, there have been approximately 260,000 murders in the United States, and 267 lives were lost in mass shootings in 2017 alone (this figure does not include the victims of Muslim-American extremists). Since 2012, 78 Muslim-Americans have been identified as joining militants abroad, according to the report. More than half of these individuals have since been killed or detained.

Alarming increase in white supremacist propaganda on U.S. college campuses

New data released Thursday by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) shows an alarming increase in white supremacist propaganda on U.S. college campuses during the 2017 fall semester. Since 1 September 2016, ADL's Center on

Extremism has recorded 346 incidents where white supremacists have used fliers, stickers, banners, and posters to spread their message. These incidents targeted 216 college campuses -- from Ivy League schools to local community colleges -- in 44 states and Washington, D.C. During the fall semester of 2017 (1 September through 31 December), there were 147 such incidents, a staggering 258 percent increase over the 41 incidents that took place during the fall semester of 2016.

2017 anti-Semitic incidents in the U.K. on the rise

The Community Security Trust's (CST) 2017 Anti-Semitic Incidents Report, published Thursday, shows that CST recorded 1,382 anti-Semitic incidents in the United Kingdom in 2017, the highest total CST has ever recorded for a calendar year. This is a 3 percent increase from the 1,346 incidents recorded during 2016, which was itself a record annual total. Q&A with Seth Mnookin on the fallacy of “both sides” journalism

Novel solution to better secure voice over internet communication

Researchers have developed a novel method to better protect Crypto Phones from eavesdropping and other forms of man-in-the-middle attacks. Crypto Phones consist of smartphone apps, mobile devices, personal computer or web-based Voice over Internet Protocol applications that use end-to-end encryption to ensure that only the user and the person they are communicating with can read what is sent. In order to secure what is being communicated, Crypto Phones require users to perform authentication tasks.

Disaster preparation

Be prepared: Society saves \$6 for every \$1 spent preparing for natural disasters

A new report from the National Institute of Building Sciences, a public-private partnership Congress established in 1974, examines the cost savings of preparing for natural disasters such as hurricanes and wildfires, many of which are worsened by climate change. The report builds on, and updates, the Institute's groundbreaking 2005 analysis of the same name. The original analysis found that for every dollar invested in pre-disaster mitigation there is a \$4 savings to society. The new report makes an even stronger case for advanced planning, finding that for every \$1 invested in federally funded pre-disaster mitigation grants society saves \$6, and for every \$1 spent on building codes society saves \$4.

Climate change-related risks to 50% of U.S. military infrastructure: Pentagon

Last Friday, the U.S. Department of Defense's Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition, Technology, and Logistics released a comprehensive new survey of climate change-related risks to military infrastructure worldwide. The vulnerability assessment does not offer any specific cost estimates related to these vulnerabilities, but it does paint a concerning picture of current climate change-related risks to military installations both at home and abroad, with around 50 percent of 1,684 sites reporting damage from six key categories of those risks: Flooding due to storm surge; flooding due to non-storm surge events (e.g., rain, snow, sleet, ice, river overflow); extreme temperatures (both hot and cold); wind; drought; and wildfire. Given that rapid climate change is projected to exacerbate most of the above categories of risks throughout this century (its effect on wind is less certain), the reasonable expectation is that vulnerabilities to military sites will only increase.
